A Brief Analysis & Comment by John Aimers

Polls released by major Canadian news organizations around Accession Day – that is, before any "bubble" favouring the Monarchy either as a result of initial celebrations of Golden Jubilee Year or of sympathy for The Queen on account of her double bereavement – show a remarkable surge in support for the Crown, muted only slightly by some anomalous internal inconsistencies in one of the major soundings.

In the poll commissioned from COM-PAS by National Post/Global Television, an astonishing 63% "believe the monarchy should maintain or strengthen its role in Canada," as opposed to 30% who somewhat or strongly wish to make Canada a republic. That result compares to 1997-99 Gallup polls which showed monarchical support ranging from 37-48% and republican sentiment in the 43-53% range. "SUPPORT FOR MONARCHY HIGHEST IN YEARS" ran the survey's sub-headline – not a bad banner for

Monarchists in Golden Jubilee Year! The survey also showed that only 18% felt strongly – and 12% moderately – that Canada should abolish the Monarchy and become a republic. 69% agreed with the statement "The government accepts the Monarchy but doesn't give it much thought."

The same poll shows that 48% of respondents think The Queen is doing the best job amongst the members of the Royal Family. Of course they do – who wouldn't? This popularity poll is somewhat meaningless. Asked who is doing the worst job, 30% name Charles fol-continued on page 2

As public and private Canadian celebrations of the Golden Jubilee gather steam, the federal government under the leadership of Heritage Minister Sheila Copps has taken the principal and overtly-enthusiastic role in promoting widespread observance of HM's 50th year on the Throne. Amongst the provinces, Saskatchewan's long tradition of multiparty support for the Crown coupled with a singularly-imaginative Protocol Office has given it undisputed leadership in Jubilee programming.

OTTAWA TURN-AROUND

In an astonishing *volte-face* from Ottawa's usually-tepid monarchism, and in sharp contrast to the meagre programme of Silver Jubilee commemorations in 1977, Ms Copps and materials from her Department spoke of the Canadian Crown in language not heard from

the federal government in over a generation.

"Fifty years after her accession to the throne, Elizabeth II remains a symbol of continuity, stability and tradition in a world that is under a barrage of constant change," said the Minister, as she launched the federal programme of Jubilee Initiatives in Ottawa on February 20th. In a National Post interview the day previous, Ms. Copps observed "The Queen, and the heritage she gives to us, is not just part of our past, but part of our common future... When you're a mature country, you don't need to break your ties with the past."

Amongst the Ottawa initiatives:

• Jubilee Celebration Funds – Government financial assistance is being made available for innovative celebrations during the Celebrate Canada period of June 21-July 1.

In a private visit that nonetheless captured both media and public attention, His Royal Highness Prince Michael of Kent journeyed across Canada in March. The Queen's Cousin, Grandson of King George V and Queen Mary, traveled under the private auspices of John Aimers, who coordinated the tour which was initiated when Her Majesty appointed HRH Colonel-in-Chief of the Essex & Kent Scottish Regiment, based in Windsor.

To the keystone welcome by the Regiment of their new Colonel were added myriad engagements in four provinces. The Prince's demanding programme ranged from attendance at three Awards Presentations of the Royal Life Saving Society of which HRH is Com-

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lowed by the Duke of Edinburgh, The Earl of Wessex, The Duke of York and the Princess Royal, each in single figures.

Two points: the phrasing of the question allows for one answer - thus it understandably places The Queen in first place. In turn it seems to have depreciated the standing of The Queen Mother, who was enormously popular, but who carried out few engagements and was perhaps seen more as a loved symbol than a "working" member of the Royal Family. Second, if one invites people to say who is doing the worst job, it almost demands an answer. Charles has overcome most of the antipathy towards him in the UK; Canadians see him less frequently, hence he faces a more arduous task to be seen as an engaging, capable future King. The evidence of his reception here last April is nonetheless encouraging from the Monarchist perspec-

One might also share the perspective that had a poll about the popularity of the then Prince of Wales, Prince Eddy, the future beloved Edward VII, been taken at the time of Victoria's Golden Jubilee, it would have revealed great condemnation from a nation scandalized by his extra-marital romances, involvement in a divorce case and a card cheating scandal. What did it mean in the long run? Nothing! Indeed, support for Victoria herself at the time of her Golden Jubilee might have reflected the strongest republican tide seen in modern Britain.

The second survey, a Globe & Mail/ CTV poll taken by Ipsos-Reid should be treated with great caution, as its results are, to the mind of any reasonable person, curiously contradictory.

The good news for Monarchists reads as follows: 79% somewhat or strongly agree with the statement "I support the constitutional monarchy as Canada's current form of government where we elect governments whose leader becomes the Prime Minister." That is, by any measure, an astonishing degree of approval for Canada's system of government. Contrary to received wisdom, the strongest cohort of support comes from the youngest Canadians. A second, lesspublicized figure reveals a perhaps morerealistic result, although still one of significant support for the Crown: 62% somewhat or strongly agree that "The constitutional monarchy helps to define Canadian identity, and should continue to be our form of government."

Balanced against these is a bizarrely-contradictory result: 48% strongly/somewhat say the constitutional monarchy is outmoded and should be replaced with a republican form of government and an elected head of state as in the USA.

But then 58% state the issue isn't worth the fuss of changing it.

"If it ain't broke, don't fix it," ran the subhead on the Globe story – perhaps the only possible conclusion out of this welter of figures. The analysis came from the poll director, John Wright, who went on to observe "[the monarchy] holds the framework together and it makes us unlike the United States. It gives us our own sense of character and culture." Readers must remember that these are the words of a neutral pollster, writing to his client, The Globe & Mail, which he knows full well advocates the republican position!

Polls do not make or break an institution. Properly read, the general trend of these two polls is encouraging to the Monarchist cause. Certainly, they suggest a great deal of support for the Crown, a positive trend in that support and no public interest whatsoever in the wrenching and divisive process of debate and constitutional change that would be required to turn Canada into a republic.

Ipsos-Reid *demographic* breakdown of the 79% positive support for constitutional monarchy:

Youngest Canadians... 86% Middle-aged Canadians... 76% Older Canadians... 74%

Ipsos-Reid also finds "Younger (66%) and older (64%) Canadians are more likely to feel that the constitutional monarchy helps to define Canada's identity than their middle-aged (57%) counterparts."

EDITOR'S NOTE

Apologies to subscribers who have patiently anticipated for some time the publication of "Canadian Monarchist News." Amidst six months' spent organizing Prince Michael's visit, the Farewell for Hon. Hilary Weston and the Governor General's Accession Day visit – as well as coping with enormous media interest in the Golden Jubilee and during the mourning for and obsequies of The Queen Mother and Princess Margaret - CMN simply did not "get done." It now resumes its more regular publication schedule every 3-4 months. CMN has not attempted to duplicate the extensive coverage already given to the two Royal Deaths above-mentioned. This is not out of any lack of respect for either Queen Elizabeth or the Princess, but rather out of recognition that they have received full in the media including special commemorative magazines - not to mention the re-issue of Messrs Bousfield & Toffoli's authoritative book – has already, in our judgement, provided loving tributes and a record of both lives and deaths which CMN would simply be duplicating. Different in personality, these two Royal Ladies shared one abiding principle: loyalty to the Throne. It to give emphasis to that forward-looking spirit that this issue has been conceived.

CANADA POST CELEBRATES GOLDEN JUBILEE

COMMEMORATIVE 48-cent STAMP BEING REPRINTED
OUELLET PROMISES RETURN OF QUEEN DEFINITIVE
FOR 2003

GOVERNOR GENERAL ANNIVERSARY STAMP ALSO ISSUED

Popular demand for Canada Post's large-sized and singularly attractive first-class rate commemorative stamp honouring The Golden Jubilee has caused a breaking of precedent by the Corporation. It is having to reprint the stamp in order to assure supplies available for sale throughout Jubilee Year! "As far as we are aware,"



a Corporation spokesman told *Canadian Monarchist News*, "this is the first time a commemorative stamp has been reprinted in Canada." The decision was in line with the December 3rd, 2001 announcement of the printing of the first 15 million stamps – that "additional quantities will be printed as needed throughout the calendar year."

Stock of the Jubilee issue had run out in many parts of the country by early Spring. Confusion caused by unavailability of the stamp was then compounded by misinformed postal clerks, often franchisees rather than employees of Canada Post. They told customers not only that no more Jubilee stamps would be forthcoming, but also that no definitive stamps of The Queen (a definitive is a domestic letter-rate stamp kept in constant stock) would be printed in 2003 and beyond.

The Canada Post spokesman admitted that officials indeed had realized the existence of confusion at some of its outlets re. the continuing availability of the Golden Jubilee stamp. "A reprint of this stamp is taking place; and a bulletin is to be sent in the forthcoming few weeks to all postal outlets, advising them that they are expected to stock both the Queen and the flag stamps and providing them with reordering information," he said.

In a letter to MP Brenda Chamberlain (L: Guelph-Wellington) Canada Post CEO Hon Andre Ouellet confirmed the return of the Queen definitive, supplanted this year by the Jubilee stamp. Writing on April 30, he said "We will return to issuing Queen definitive stamps in 2003." M. Ouellet went on to suggest that all stamp products may be ordered through the National Philatelic Centre, reached toll-free at (800) 565-4362.

In announcing the issuance of the commemorative, Canada Post underlined that The Queen was "the fourth British [sic] Monarch to have achieved this feat." Technical information about the stamp supplied by the Corporation states that "Design of the stamp is by Gottschalk+Ash International, a multi-disciplinary design firm with offices in Toronto, Montreal, Calgary and Zurich. The stamp features the traditional symbol of Canada, the maple leaf, and an image of the Queen. Ashton-Potter will print the stamp on Tullis Russell Paper, using 8-colour lithography and metallic inks. Measuring 37.5 mm by 32 mm (horizontally), the stamp has general tagging on four sides and will be perforated at 13+. The cancellation on the Official First-Day Cover will be Ottawa, Ontario."

February 1st saw the issue of four million commemorative

stamps marking the 50th Anniversary of the appointment of Vincent Massey, the first Canadian Governor General. According to a Canada Post release, the image, designed by Neville Smith of Aylmer, Quebec, "features a combination of the official lion symbol (representing the office of the Governor General), a stylized line drawing of Rideau Hall, and the



names of the nine Canadian Governors General. The stamp's primary colours are purple, gold and red, reflecting the official colours associated with the Governor General and Canada, while the numeral "50" indicates the anniversary year."

any commentators expressed their surprise at the ubiquity of lowered Maple Leaf flags decreed by official protocol for Margaret, who perhaps enjoyed rather greater public and media sympathy in death following a series of debilitating strokes than



she had in life, and despite her relative absence from the public stage in recent years.

Newsnet and Newsworld along with local stations gave extensive air time to the news of her death, the Prince of Wales' tribute to "my darling Aunt" and the private Funeral at Windsor, while the national mood seemed to be one of reflection: sympathy for The Queen, bereaved only days after the commencement of Golden Jubilee Year; and admiration of the Princess, largely depicted as

the victim of a love denied in the 1950's, which sacrifice had blighted her subsequent life.

The Governor General recalled "her enthusiasm for music and ballet," while the Prime Minister lauded Margaret's "grace, style and sense of compassion." Her Canadian associations - hospital, school, regiment, ballet, a supposed romance with John Turner (who called her "a good pal") were warmly recalled, as well. One leitmotif was respect for an aspect of Margaret's life that had ever held constant: her devotion to the Throne and to her sister The Queen. Outgoing Ontario Lieutenant Governor Hilary Weston, a friend of the Princess, said that she had "placed public duty ahead of private life," while

Manitoba viceroy Peter Liba issued a statement expressing how "The Queen Mother embodied all that is best about the Monarchy – devotion to duty, grace and dignity, perseverance... and the unifying role of the Crown as a non-partisan symbol representing all citizens regardless of differences." Michael Valpy writing in the Globe and Mail, called her "more generous and affectionate than the public knew. Her public services...were considerable and largely unnoticed."

Remarkably, The Queen continued with her Jubilee Tour of Jamaica, New Zealand and Australia, departing only 72 hours after Princess Margaret's Funeral.

Former Prime Minister John Turner represented Canada at the Memorial Service held in London on April; 19th, the Governor General having flown to Germany in order to comfort troops and families after the Canadian contingent had suffered its first casualties in the war against terrorism. The Abbey Service was attended by nearly all The Royal Family and some 2,100 guests (with 500 chosen by ballot from amongst members of the public requesting to attend). It included no eulogy, at the Princess' request. The music included excerpts from Faure's Requiem and the hymn Ye Holy Angels Bright. Viscount Linley and Felicity Kendal gave the readings.

ews of The Queen Mother's death on Saturday of Easter weekend brought even more universal a half-masting of flags across the Maple Realm, and a deep sense of affection and gratitude for a life so long and well lived, coupled with renewed sympathy for The Queen who had lost both Mother and Sister within a seven-week period.

In a tribute as touching as it was unexpected, fans in Edmonton attending the Oilers-Dallas Stars game sang The Royal Anthem instead of "O Canada" at the start of the hockey match. In Digby Mayor Frank MacKintosh ordered flags lowered even before the official advice had come from Ottawa. In Hamilton, Aubrey Oldham lowered his family's flag to half-staff as CHCH Television recorded the sad moment. In Kitchener, Chanelle Seguin, 11, inscribed her name and address in a condolence book dedicated to the Queen Mother at a local funeral home, saying "She was very important to us because she was a good lady to everyone." And in the Old Capital of Quebec, where Her Late Majesty had first set foot in the Dominion in 1939, Holy Trinity Cathedral's congregation began Easter services with the singing of The Royal Anthem, while its bell ringers preceded Evensong with a half-muffled quarter peal, a tribute duplicated across the Rockies by the Vancouver Society of Change Ringers at Holy Rosary Cathedral.

Television coverage was non-stop throughout the weekend and the subsequent stages of the Lying in State and Funeral, and lengthy accounts of Queen Elizabeth's life and many journeys across Canada filled the Sunday newspapers, with the two national papers adding special supplements on Monday. Siobhan Rogers of *National Post* wrote a particularly well-researched piece tracing the two occasions when HM's appointment as Governor General was seriously

mooted. Only the *Globe* and Mail's Jeff Simpson spoiled the national mood of remembrance with a predictably sour and admonitory screed.

Prime Minister Chretien issued a statement in which he called her "a touchstone of timeless values and continuity. We were blessed by her full life, made richer by her presence and example, and feel a profound sense of loss that her extraordinary spirit

is gone." The Canadian Alliance web site also carried a tribute. After an apparent bureaucratic tussle, mercifully alluded to but sketchily by a sleepy national media, it was determined that The Governor General should remain in Ottawa to preside over National Mourning, while the Prime Minister broke from his African tour to attend the obsequies in London.



According to the Toronto SUN, when a Commonwealth leaders meeting made his arrival at the Funeral run late, Chretien, along with prime ministers from Australia and New Zealand, was forced to enter through the Poets' Corner entrance rather than the West Door of the Abbey. Buckingham Palace press officer David McCombes told Sun Media the royal family in no way meant to snub Chretien: "It's not in any way a snub, really. That was the only thing that could be done at the time. Had he been an hour earlier, he could have come through the Great West Door."

ant Governor of Ontario by Easter Monday. With characteristic delicacy, Quebec Lieutenant Governor Lise Thibault wrote, "As Easter Day was preparing to unfold its wings of hope, Her Majesty... took her flight toward her Eternity... a true symbol of constancy and faithfulness throughout the motions of life," NS Lieutenant Governor Myra Freeman lauded her as "Matriarch of the Commonwealth," while Saskatchewan Premier Lorne Calvert said "A blanket of sorrow covers us all." A Royal Proclamation issued to set aside the day of the Funeral for Canadians to honour The Queen Mother's memory.

A chain of Memorial Services quickly sprung up across Canada. In Toronto, Archbishop Terence Finlay spoke from his Cathedral pulpit about The Queen Mother's long and good life, a scene repeated in capital and cathedral cities, as well as in parish churches, throughout the land. Saskatchewan alone organized Provincial Memorial Services, held in Prince Albert, Saskatoon and Regina, the last two being Ecumenical services at which The Lieutenant Governor gave the address. Moose Jaw and Maple Creek parishes also held observances, the former arranged by Monarchist League Chairman Fr Derek Nicholls, who had also participated in the Regina service at which members of the local Branch had arranged a special display in the Cathedral narthex.

Some of the most contemporary and deeply-felt Canadian memories of The Queen Mother came throughout the mourning period from LCol Julian Chapman, Commanding Officer of The Toronto Scottish Regiment (Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother's Own). Having lunched with the Regiment's Colonel-in-Chief of 65 years as recently as July 2001, Col Chapman recalled her deep affection for Canada: "She felt the Canadian people had really opened their arms to herself and the King on their first visit in 1939. To know Canada would be there in Britain's darkest hours was very important to her."

Among Canadians attending the Funeral in addition to contingents from The Queen Mother's three Regiments were Doug Fee, of the Canadian Angus Association and David Willmot, President of the Ontario Jockey Club.

Monarchist League Vice-Chairman Paul Benoit summed up his tribute in these words: "While remaining at the apex of the pyramid of state, The Queen Mother positioned the Monarch at the centre, or more precisely, at the heart of civil society." Jacques Monet, sj, the noted historian and monarchist, penned a graceful personal reflection in The Globe and Mail, stating that "The Queen Mother has played a determining part" in securing the position of the Canadian Monarchy.



The Royal Walkabout invented, The National War Memorial, 1939 – Their Majesties unescorted amidst a crowd of Great War veterans – "I wish Hitler could see this," one remarked.

GOVERNOR GENERAL EULOGIZES QUEEN MOTHER

[Ed. Note: as Her Excellency has so frequently demonstrated, Canada is blessed with a Viceroy who is singularly eloquent, and able to capture exactly the national mood in her public discourses. Amidst the barrage of sincere but inevitably much-ofa-kind tributes, Mme Clarkson spoke these her – thus our own – words of loyalty and love at the National Commemoration Celebrating The Queen Mother's Life, held at Christ Church Cathedral, Ottawa, on April 9th.]

May only the truth be spoken, may only the truth be heard.

Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother accepted the place that divine providence found for her. She accepted the society of her contemporaries. She understood the connection of events. She was not born to be Queen; she was not married to become Queen. She was the wife of a second son, but the event that made her a Queen was the unexpected abdication of the popular older brother of her husband. About this event, she had no influence. However, she understood that this was what she was meant to do and she accepted it with grace, with humour, with style and, most importantly, with intention.

People can easily confuse intention with ambition or goals. In fact, intention is much larger and more important than those aims. Her whole life showed that she had intention. That sunny and lucky quality that we all sensed in her stemmed from something deep and profound. For people with intention are the most fortu-



nate of human beings: they know that what they have to do is the same as what they most want to do. When that kind of identification happens, every person watching understands its profound impact. Impact not only on the intentional person herself, but also on her family, her country and the world in which she has influence.

She became Queen at the time when the sun never set on the British Empire; she was the last Empress of India. And from the intentionality of her character she responded to her duty without setting any limits on intensity. Everyone who has watched her life knows this, even if they are critical of the details, even if they are obsessed with the superficial. None of this makes any difference, because we are today remembering a woman who expressed the kind of human freedom that made it impossible to set any limits to what she could do.

There was no public relations firm to tell her to walk through the areas of a destroyed London, wearing her hat and her high-heeled shoes and her warm smile. There was no one telling her to create her image by staying in a city being bombarded by enemy aircraft.

While most people consider that their family and their country are the inner and outer limits of their community, we see in the Queen Mother somebody who knew that the limits were undefined. She understood that no bounds can be finally placed upon a human being's responsibility to their fellows, no matter what

their station in life. There isn't anyone in the world who has ever seen a picture or a television image of the Queen Mother as she waved, smiled and nodded her feather hat who doesn't instinctively feel that she knew what she was doing. This gave us as people a sense of stability and assurance.

There are critics who say that this was simply a part of the job and that she happened to do it very well. But if you examine the evidence over the last seventy years, you see that it is not because of those smiles and waves that she became important to us. It is because she communicated the intention behind the smiles and waves. And she genuinely believed that she could communicate with us; believed that what she was doing was important to us. Whether we accepted or rejected it was our personal business. But she knew and she intended it.

When John Ralston Saul and I went to London in October of 2000 to invest her as a Companion of the Order of Canada, she was a delight. She had that capacity to infect you with enthusiasm through her wit and charm and, most of all, her memory. She invited us to lunch and we expected it to be a small courtesy event. Instead it was

a beautiful lunch for 16 people. Each guest had a connection to Canada one was a descendant of the Earl of Athlone, the Governor General at the time of the Ouebec Conference; another, a man whose grandfather had been asked to be Governor General in the 1930s, but who had declined because of the precarious health of his wife. The whole event was warm, friendly, and had a purpose and a meaning.

I've only learned since her death that the extraordinarily beautiful gold place settings which she used for this lunch were not normally put out. But in the words of her friend – Lord St. John – who was also with us, the settings were brought out specially, because she wanted to honour our country, which she referred to

several times as "lovely Canada" and "dear Canada".

It was exciting and yet completely relaxing to be in the company of such a hostess; knowledgeable, witty, tasteful and curious. I felt that she had done honour to our country because the Governor General of Canada had honoured her on behalf of our country. She insisted on wearing the insignia of the Order all the way through lunch, over her pearls and against her turquoise chiffon day dress.

This kind of spirit, this kind of intention, does not spring out of the fact that somebody has been born and lived all their life in privilege. There are many people who live in privilege in Canada, in

Great Britain, anywhere in the world, who never have the sense of intention, who never are able to communicate to people that sense of community, that sense which I can only describe as peace.

In St. Augustine's City of God, he talks about the world as a divine city: there are good people, whether Christians or not, and every one of them belongs in the City of God. St. Augustine points out that one of the finest attributes of the City of God, the ideal of human community, is peace. The kind of city, of community, that we in Canada are trying to build, with hope. He defines peace as "the perfectly ordered and harmonious communion of those who find their joy in God and in one another in God ... Peace in its final sense is



the calm that comes of order." In the words of the anthem that has just been sung, "Thy will keep him in perfect peace whose mind is stayed on thee."

The quality of peace and intention in the life of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother is an example to us of how we may all try in our own lives, in our own work, in our own communities, to communicate meaning, to live with purpose. And to accomplish this with a lightness of spirit, a humorous sociability and a contagious warmth.

It was the Queen Mother's intention that enabled her to finish the race, to keep the faith, and, finally, to soar on wings as eagles do.



OTTAWA COMMEMORATION SERVICE IMPRESSIONS

In general, the memorial service for the Queen Mother was well thought out, pleasantly entertaining, and very formal; well suited to a lady of royalty. Three things particularly stood out, making the service wonderful. First, the eulogy by the Governor General was the centre piece of the ceremony, which she delivered very well. It was filled with praise for the life of the Queen Mother on a personal level; seemingly written by Her Excellency herself, rather than having been scripted. This added a nice dimension of quality. Second, the choice of hymns and readings was deliberate to give an insight into the personal likings of the Queen Mother, being chosen from a selection of her favourites. Third, the background of the people assembled was diverse and refreshing. People from all ethnical, social, political, and religious heritages were present, a nice tribute to an institution that is applicable to everyone. As a note, the 40% or so seats for the general public were filled by the time I arrived, and I was over an hour early! The reserved seats didn't even begin to fill until noon. A lone lament by a piper added a quaint touch. Overall, the service, though highly formal and rigid, was fitting and enjoyable to commemorate such a remarkable woman.

Paul Benoit adds

Christ Church (Anglican) Cathedral was once again the site of a public ceremony important for the whole country. Along with the War Memorial, which is only a few blocks away, it has acquired official status as a place to mark events that are both religious and patriotic in nature. These sites compliment Parliament Hill, which accommodates more festive and political events, as the gathering places of our public life. One of the reasons the Cathedral has attained this

status is the excellence of the music, which for many years has been under the direction of Frances Macdonnell. But also contributing is the experience the Church has in integrating into a coherent and tasteful service the policy requirements of bilingualism and multiculturalism. For unlike the service held two months earlier to commemorate the anniversary of Her Majesty's accession to the throne, which was solely a Christ Church initiative, the Queen Mother's commemorative service was organized with the help of the Department of Canadian Heritage...

The hymns chosen for the service – "Praise, my soul, the King of heaven", "The Lord's my Shepherd", and "Guide me, O thou great Jehovah" – had personal significance for the Queen Mother, as did the anthems: the "Hallelujah Chorus" and "Thou wilt keep him in perfect peace", which was sung at the Coronation in 1937.

The readings and prayers were delivered by an impressive array of religious leaders: the Very Reverend Shane A. D. Parker, the Dean of Ottawa; Father Jacques Faucher, the Ecumenical Officer of the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Ottawa; Janet Somerville, the General Secretary of the Canadian Council of Churches; Rabbi Reuvan Bulka, of the Congregation Machzikei Hadas; Pandit Madhu Sahasrabudhe, Chairperson of the Capital Region Interfaith Council; Imam Gamal Solaiman, of the Ottawa Mosque; Rohahes Iain Philips, of the Mohawk Nation; and Ajit Sahota, of the International Sikh Organization...

Particularly moving in this regard was the showing, by video, later in the service of the Queen Mother receiving the Order of Canada from the Governor General in London in October 2001.

The Government is to be congratulated for providing Canadians with the opportunity of rendering homage to a lady who was, in different senses of the term, the First Queen of Canada.

THE QUEEN MOTHER

Commentary by Rafal Heydel-Mankoo

"The Queen Mother is dead". How strange it is that such a short sentence can so easily unsettle and disconcert. The words sound hollow and somehow false. They suggest that all is not right with the world. One might just as well write that the Statue of Liberty has sunk beneath the waves or that the Holy See is moving to Winnipeg. That the Queen Mother is no longer with us simply sounds impossible.

The Queen Mother was a constant. World wars were fought and won, fanatical ideologies rose and collapsed, empires crumbled, politicians and dictators were granted fifteen minutes only to become faded names in yellowed newspapers, fashions changed, traditions ended, the Queen Mother remained. Over the decades, as the world changed ever more dramatically, ever more rapid-

ly, becoming, in the process, both increasingly chaotic and unfamiliar, the Queen Mother stood as a steadfast symbol of stability and continuity. She grounded us. We looked upon her as a Methuselah. The sight of that slight figure with her enchanting smile and genteel wave was enough to remind us that some things never change. From this we drew comfort and hope.

The Queen Mother was more than a constant, however. The Queen Mother was an institution. Born a Victorian and raised an Edwardian, the span of the Queen Mother's life is the span of our collective memory. Rightly or wrongly we largely divide history into two chronological periods: twentieth century history and pre-twentieth century history. The events that occurred in the years before the Queen Mother's birth are considered as remote as the Spanish Armada or the expeditions of Columbus. That which occurred after the Queen Mother's birth is familiar history, history to which we can relate, modern history, our his-

At the Queen Mother's birth men still debated whether we would ever take to the air, horse-drawn carriages had not yet surrendered the road to their noisy rival, the term "Titanic" carried no notion of tragedy and universal suffrage was a concept bound to rouse heated emotions. At the time of the Queen Mother's death people were planning holidays in space,


automobiles had become indispensable to life in the western world, the term "World Trade Centre" had joined and perhaps surpassed that of "Titanic" and women had led the governments of several powerful nations.

The Queen Mother was the Twentieth Century. She aged as the century aged and, in so doing, would ultimately be looked upon as a physical embodiment of modern history. She served as a rare bridgehead to the events of yesteryear. Through her we felt a tangible connection to our heritage and to our roots, those elements so critical to the founda-

tion of any lasting national identity. Whilst she was alive, the early years of the last century did not seem so remote and thus our place in our national story could be better understood and realised.

These factors alone would render the Queen

To her we could look for examples of strength during adversity and calmness of spirit during times of upheaval. Yes Hitler did call her 'the most dangerous woman in Europe' and that defiant spirit was no less







Government House, through private donors including The Heraldry Society and the Monarchist League, is refurbishing and re-situating the 42 shields of Arms of those members of the Royal family and Governors-General who have stopped there.

ALBERTA: ARTS & SCHOLARS HONOURED IN QUEEN'S NAME, WEB SITE SET UP

The Program for the Opening of the Legislature on Feb 26 bore a picture of Her Majesty and the Canadian Golden Jubilee logo. All assembled sang The Royal Anthem, accompanied by the Band of the RCAC who were



arrayed in dress uniforms in the Press Gallery.

In the Speech from the Throne, Hon Lois Hole, the Lieutenant Governor, called the Jubilee "an auspicious anniversary that Albertans recognize with gratitude and love. Her Majesty has been a symbol of peace and stability for more than half a century. Long may she reign."

Her Honour went on to announce the following Jubilee initiatives – "to serve as a permanent remembrance of this historic anniversary" – on behalf of the Government:

- a new Premier's Citizenship Award will be established to recognize high school students' achievement in citizenship, community participation and leadership. Each year five students will receive the Queen's Golden Jubilee Citizenship Medal and a \$5000 Award.
- The Queen's Jubilee Scholarship for the Visual and Performing Arts will be established.

SASKATCHEWAN GROWS MONARCHISTS AS WELL AS WHEAT!

Amongst a plethora of initiatives to mark the Jubilee in the heartland of the Prairies, including a Royal Proclamation declaring May 14-20 The Queen's Golden Jubilee Week in Saskatchewan, Provincial Secretary Joanne Crofford has written every school, library, Legion hall, municipality and loyal society to present each a framed portrait of The Queen. The Jubilee pictures were made available by Canadian Her-

itage, and then framed at the Province's expense. "The Crown is an important symbol of our identity and unity as Canadians," wrote the NDP Minister, who went on to suggest that the portrait be hung "in a prominent place so it can be enjoyed by as many people as possible."

Other Saskatchewan Jubilee commemorations include

- A Government House celebration presided over by The Lieutenant Governor on The Queen's Official Canadian Birthday, Victoria Day, including entertainment and Regional launch of the RCM's Jubilee 50-cent coin, coupled with a community bell-ringing programme
- The suggestion that community flower beds be planted in the colour and shape of the Jubilee logo
- The commissioning of a bronze statue of The Queen on her favorite horse, Burmese (presented by the RCMP in 1969). The work is to be designed by local sculptor Susan Velder, to be erected on the Legislative Assembly grounds, paid for by a combination of individual contributions and \$30,000 of public funds. In an Accession Day letter to National Post, Premier Lorne Calvert called the statue "One last ride etched in bronze filling golden memories for future generations to enjoy and to remember."
- Creation of an e-postcard of greetings to The Queen: www.iaa.gov.sk.ca/ provsec, along with the opening of Books



of Congratulation in the Legislative Building, Regina and the Cabinet Office, Saskatoon.

- The publication of a new booklet, with distribution to all schools and libraries, outlining all Saskatchewan's official symbols, *Images of a Province: Symbols of Sask*atchewan
- A dedicated Jubilee website has been established at www.gov.sk.ca/jubilee

Many of the Province's initiatives were developed by The Saskatchewan Committee for The Queen's Golden Jubilee, chaired by the Lieutenant Governor, and composed of representatives from the Provincial Government, RCMP, Legion, HMCS Queen, Canadian Club, Royal Regina Rifles, Federation of Saskatchewan Indian Nations, 15 Wing Moose Jaw, Monarchist League of Canada and Department Canadian Heritage.

At a December 10 launch ceremony at Government House, Her Honour Dr Lynda Haverstock underlined "The Crown has come to symbolize the unity of the people of Canada; furthermore, it helps us to maintain our distinctiveness. Our monarch represents the per-

manence and stability of our nation, which transcends the ebb and flow of party politics."

MANITOBA GILDS GOLDEN BOY

The Golden Boy standing atop the dome of the Manitoba Legislative Building is one of Manitoba's best known symbols. Set in place in 1919, the graceful statue carries a sheaf of grain symbolizing the fruits of labour. The torch held high above his head as he strides forward calls on the youth of Manitoba to join in the pursuit and building of a more prosperous future. The Golden Boy faces north, looking toward Manitoba's rich natural resources, and has become an internationally recognized symbol of Manitoba's achievements and heritage.

In October 2000, the Manitoba gov-



ernment embarked on the latest stage of a multi-year restoration and repair project for the Manitoba Legislative Building and the Golden Boy. As part of the project a careful examination and technical study of the statue revealed a need for major repairs and replacement of the central support structure. It was decided that the famous statue would be taken down to ensure it could be properly repaired and restored. Restoration of the



Golden Boy will ensure his integrity and safety for future generations.

On February 9th, 2002 the 1,650-kilogram (3,640 pound) Golden Boy was removed from the top of the building. As a treasured and historical icon, every precaution was taken during this process to protect the statue. After a few minutes to lower it from the dome, the statue was then loaded onto a flat bed truck to begin the short journey to the Manitoba Museum for public display. The Golden Boy will remain on display at the museum until early March 2002. Restoration and re-installation of the Golden Boy is expected to be complete by the Queen's visit in October 2002.

The Manitoba Government is also distributing the new photo portrait of The Queen to all the province's schools.

lagging behind other provinces in developing its Jubilee celebrations. In a March 14 letter to Monarchist League Dominion Chairman John Aimers, outgoing Citizenship Minister Cam Jackson wrote that "special activities and events will be announced throughout the year" The Archives of Ontario will mount an exhibition of Royal associations with the Province, the government will include the Golden Jubilee logo in much of its print materials and Ontario Honours will highlight the Jubilee, as well.

At the Speech from the Throne inaugurating the Eves administration, no mention whatsoever was made of the Golden Jubilee, an omission that surprised and disappointed Monarchists. Mr Aimers mentioned this to several Ministers and MPP's; and briefly discussed Jubilee plans with the newly-appointed Citizenship Minister, the Hon. Carl DeFaria at a Reception following the Speech.

However, local communities are nothing daunted by the lack of provincial leadership. A model community approach to celebrating the Jubilee has emerged from the fast-growing suburb of Markham, 15 miles north-east of Toronto. With the energetic support of Mayor Don Cousens, In January its Council established a Golden Jubilee Committee under the chairmanship of Stu Kellock, with the active participation of Councillor Jack Heath, and of Monarchist League members Aaron Campbell, Kwan-Ho Leung and Bev Stewart. The Committee has already executed several events: A Citizenship Court on Accession Day, February 6th emceed by Lloyd Robertson; and a Queen's Birthday Cake-Cutting at a packed local mall which was addressed by the Dominion Chairman if the League. Much of the Markham activity was reported by the Ming Pao daily, one of the large Chinese newspapers in the GTA. Another Toronto suburb, Georgetown, is planning to rebuild a bridge in Cedarvale Park and name it "Jubilee Bridge" in The Queen's honour. Niagara on the Lake held a large community celebration on The Queen's Birthday, presided over by the "Lord Mayor." And Hamilton announced it would plant a special tree in Her Majesty's honour.

QUEBEC GOVERNMENT BOYCOTTS "MONARCHICAL FOLLY"

The Government of Quebec has declined to take part in Jubilee celebrations, its Minister of Inter- governmental affairs dubbing them "a monarchical folly." Jean-Pierre Charbonneau said that Canada was "a kind of disguised British colony," and he recalled The Queen's approving a Canadian Constitution in 1982 which had been rejected by a majority of both Parti Quebecois and Liberal members in Quebec's National Assembly. Monarchist League Chairman John Aimers suggested that M. Charbonneau's position would not stop individual Quebeckers from honouring The Queen they admire. He further pointed out that in 1982 The Queen was only following her constitutional role; and that indeed it was she whose speech on Parliament Hill drew attention to the absence of Quebec from the Proclamation Ceremonies, for which she expressed regret.

NOVA SCOTIA: FISHERS OF LOYALTY

Premier John Hamm and Murray Scott, Speaker of the House of Assembly, marked the Golden Jubilee of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II at May ceremonies in Halifax on May 16. The Golden Jubilee flag was raised on the south lawn of Province House, where it was to fly throughout Royal Week until sunset on Victoria Day, Monday, May 20.

Premier Hamm said the flag symbol-

izes the Queen's representation for the past 50 years. "The Queen – our Queen – represents a Commonwealth based upon enduring freedoms, remarkable diversity and a tradition of lasting peace. She represents, in an extraordinary way, the values we share," he said.

The Premier, Mr. Scott and Lt.-Gov. Myra Freeman also unveiled an art piece commissioned specifically for the Golden Jubilee. The traditional Greek earthenware cup was created by Tracy Van de Wiel of Antigonish, who is a student at the Nova Scotia College of Art and Design. Ms. Van de Wiel's creation was chosen from six student submissions for its relevance to the Jubilee themes and her use of Nova Scotia materials.

"This piece is special not only because it commemorates the Queen's 50-year anniversary, but also because of the significant tie the college has with the monarchy," said Mr. Scott. The college was founded by Anna Leonowens in 1887 in celebration of Queen Victoria's Jubilee. Speaker Scott remarked that the Jubilee cup will serve as a lasting legacy to the Queen's Golden Jubilee and will reside at Province House on a permanent basis for all to enjoy

On May 3rd, the Speaker announced in the Legislative Assembly that in honour the Golden Jubilee, a framed portrait of The Queen would be presented to every school on the Island.

From 18 May 2002 through 18 July 2002, the following special prefixes are authorised on a voluntary basis:

XM1 for VE1s, XL1 for VA1s, XM2 for VE2s, XL2 for VA2s, XM3 for VE3s, XL3 for VA3s, XM4 for VE4s, XL4 for VA4s, XM5 for VE5s, XL5 for VA5s, XM6 for VE6s, XL6 for VA6s, XM7 for VE7s, XL7 for VA7s, XM8 for VE8s, XM9 for VE9s, XN1 for VO1s, XN2 for VO2s, XO0 for VY0s, XO0 for VY1s, and XO2 for VY2s.

Please note that this period includes the Radio Amateurs of Canada's (RAC) Canada Day Contest on 1 July 2002 (please see http://www.rac.ca/CANDAY. htm) and the International Amateur Radio Union's (IARU) HF Championship on 13 and 14 July 2002 (please see http://www.arrl.org/contests/rules/2002/rules-iaru.html). I have a copy of the letter of authorisation and I would be willing to e-mail it to anyone who requires it.

For those not familiar with Amateur Radio, it is a hobby enjoyed by approximately 50,000 Canadians and two million people around the world. Also known as Ham Radio, people involved in this hobby pass examinations are are licensed to experiement with radio transmitters and receivers. Radio Amateurs can and do communicate with others around the world, using a variety of conventional and advanced communications techniques, using equipment and antennas installed in their own homes, their vehicles and in all sort of interesting locations.

Canadians especially via our web sites; more successful, thanks to the hard work of yourselves and your fellow monarchists across the Dominion.

As we turn our focus towards the Jubilee Homecoming of The Queen this Thanksgiving, we reflect with pride and gratitude on all the gifts she has given us during her 50 years on the Maple Throne.

Hers was a life full of incident, perhaps more like our own in its ups and downs reflecting the restless shifting of norms in the second half of a century

which proved a polar opposite to the five decades preceding. It may be that Margaret, in common with some of her generation and many of the next, never quite succeeded in reconciling the opposing pulls of these two worlds. Nonetheless, three constants remained to the end. She was loyal – to her Sister and Realm and friends in deed and in word. She raised and loved and was deeply loved by two happy, successful children. She worshiped God and sought His strength in the Sacraments of her Church. In the final analysis, would we not be content if such could be said of us?



MICHAEL: THE QUEEN'S MAN IN CANADA

His Royal Highness Prince Michael of Kent is a man of many accomplishments. From January 1998 to the end of February 2002, he undertook 699 charitable and non-commercial engagements, in the process making 46 trips to 26 different countries including 11 to Russia alone, his passion springing out of the heritage of his bloodlines as he strives to assist her to regain the engine of enterprise and thus her traditional place

amongst the family of western powers.

What a Royal trouper is this Prince! Here in Canada he crossed seven time zones, undertook nearly three-score engagements, boarded 13 flights, visited nine communities in four

provinces and made about 19 speeches not to mention a clutch more of "few wordses," as in, "Your Royal Highness, would you just say a few words?" – in 12 days! For all this – just as for those 699 engagements – he receives not a penny from either the Civil List or the Privy Purse or the host organizations.

It is one thing to have "done" such a tour. We have all seen the great and good go through the motions, cold of demeanour, consciousness light years distant. We even saw Diana in this mode on a few occasions. It must be enormously tiring – and more than occasionally tiresome – to be piped into countless rooms, to dine with different strangers every night, to receive gifts of all sizes and shapes and

portabilities – and, above all, to be the focus of every human eye. Not to mention the relentless camera just waiting for a shot suitable for the front page of London tabloids whose appetite for the embarrassing is as great as their acquaintance with journalism and truth is slight.

What so moved us about Prince Michael was his genuinely selfless devotion to The Queen and her Throne. This was reflected as much in his attitude and demeanour as in the warm words he spoke of his Royal Cousin. A gentleman, reserved, stylish but still conservative in dress; whimsically funny, acutely obser-

vant; forgiving of mistakes by those trying to serve him; ready to laugh at the inevitable absurd moments; genuinely moved by the warmth of the loyal and the excitement of the many young people he met; willing to do anything for the Crown consistent with an innate aura of dignity that surrounds him – and modest despite all fuss and ceremony.

It was an enormous privilege for Canadians to reacquaint themselves with His Royal Highness. During every one of a fairly exhausting twelve days he could have been taking his ease; perhaps he should have been earning his living. Instead – he served Her Majesty. We do not doubt that she – and all of us whose lives he touched if but briefly, this wonderful exemplar of the spirit of Jubilee Year – do indeed stand in his debt and respect him most deeply for the great gift of himself.

HILARY WESTON: THE QUEEN'S CHAMPION

"Thank you for taking on a job some would describe as thankless, or redundant, or anachronistic, and proving that it can be meaningful, progressive and make a real difference." So spoke the ever-eloquent John Fraser, Master of Toronto's Massey College, at its Corporation High Table which dined out the Lieutenant Governor of Ontario just prior to her leaving office. Hilary Weston came to her task having been excoriated by a media skeptical of her background of privilege. She left with even her harshest critics admitting in headlines they had been dead wrong.

We are privileged to have first-hand exposure to most of the Lieutenant Governors, and to admire their often-unheralded work on behalf of the Canadian Crown. Usually, theirs is not the stuff of headlines in the national media, but of the columns in community weeklies. But the ceaseless round of community visits and charitable endeavours – Mrs Weston attended over 1300 events, delivered over 600 speeches and visited some 90 communities in five years – knits together a great deal of the fabric of this land, and is enormously appreciated by all whom it touches.

In public duty as in private station, Mrs Weston brought a gimlet eye for detail, a determination to serve, to make a difference, to open her Office to those who perhaps before had not thought of it as their own, or as mattering to their concerns. Whether in hugging a battered woman at a shelter, making a midnight visit to Toronto's homeless on the streets and under the expressways, creating career vistas for youth or delivering speeches in a voice at once most gentle and yet most commanding of attention, Her Honour embraced us all.

It is also under her aegis that the Monarchist League Summer Intern programme began: six have had the priceless





opportunity to serve her at Queen's Park; and even as a seventh works for her successor this year, the reach of the programme has grown to assist vice-regal offices in British Columbia and Nova Scotia, as well.

With her husband Galen, who took enormous pride in Her Honour's accomplishments, and in turn gave generous support and time to assist her despite his own considerable responsibilities, Her Honour twice greeted the Heir to the Throne on Canadian soil. Twice the Westons made sure that Charles received an exposure – to skiing in the Rockies with his boys, to meeting diverse figures in the Canadian arts scene - and we to our next King, that government could not have effected. That is not the least of Their Honours' services on a stage beyond any one province's concerns. For many of her colleague Lieutenant Governors felt enormously inspired by her spirit and example.

We hope Hilary Weston feels the satisfaction of knowing how deeply she is loved, how profoundly respected. We wish her fair winds, fresh seas, fascinating harbours – and fond love.

BRAVO SHEILA!



Whatever the convergence of movement towards the Monarchy in the polls and jockeying for position in some future leadership race and genuine affection for the Sovereign and close political calculus, there can be no

doubt of a sea change in some of official Ottawa in respect of views about the Crown – or at least a willingness to celebrate the Golden Jubilee and to recognize that, as constitutional reality dictates, if the Crown is going to be around a very long time Canada might as well make the best use of it!

However, Sheila Copps' spearheading the Jubilee celebration with far more than token courtesy but real imagination and flare strikes us as a more genuine phenomenon. Criticize her judgement, chuckle at her exuberant style, step back a pace as she welcomes Charles with a kiss – but never question her loyalty, her resilience, her sincerity.

It would have been easy for the feds to have sloughed off the Golden Jubilee with a token coin, a scholarship fund and a three-day visit by The Queen to Ottawa-Hull. Public opinion would have resented it; but loyalty to the Crown mercifully is not the stuff of election issues or sustained Parliamentary debate. They could have "got away with it" as they did in '77 for the Silver Jubilee.

That they did not reflects, yes, the deep bonds between Queen and Maple Realm; yes, the hard work of the various Loyal Societies including The Monarchist League – but also the persistence and good judgment and loyal heart of Sheila Copps. Bravo, Sheila!

CROWN & MACES FOR ROYAL CANADIAN MINT • HALIFAX MEDIA, MLA GANG UP ON LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR ROYAL COMMONWEALTH SOCIETY: DEFEATISM IN ESSAY COMPETITION

PARLIAMENT

cROWN to Senator Lowell Murray whose swift action forced newlyappointed Senator Raymond Lavigne to retake his oath of office in the Clerk's Chamber because he added the words "and to Canada" to the end of the Oath pre-



scribed in the Constitution Act. Sen. Murray objected, saying the new senator was creating a precedent that might be taken advantage of by Quebec separatists who might want to add their own choice of words in the future. "Another honourable senator might decide to swear allegiance to Her Majesty the Queen and to his or her spouse and children, or to the republic of Madawaska or to Opus Dei," said Murray. Lavigne claimed that he had added the words to further establish his credentials as a federalist. The rooky Senator clearly needs a crash course in civics as he is confounding his worthy intention with behaviour suggesting that he feels his wishes should run roughshod over the law. As well, he needs to understand how in swearing allegiance to The Queen, the embodiment of Canada, he does demonstrate his loyalty to Canada!

THE PROVINCES

MACE to Nova Scotia Opposition Leader Darrell Dexter, who in opposing the singing of The Royal Anthem in the Legislative Assembly, wrote, "The Royal Anthem is not appropriate in a legislative chamber whose constitutional purpose is to assert people's democratic right to govern themselves rather than be ruled by a monarch... God Save The Queen was replaced by O Canada as Canada's national anthem as a sign that the colonial era had truly ended... It was needlessly divisive to try and ignore our constitutional conventions and bring the royal anthem [sic] into the chamber." Stuff and nonsense! Loyalty to the Crown has often been proclaimed by MP's and MLA's as a reflection that Canada is a Monarchy, to which there is no "constitutional" objection whatsoever, witness the singing of the Royal Anthem in the House of Commons on Accession Day.

THE ROYAL CANADIAN MINT

CROWN to the Royal Canadian Mint for its enthusiastic celebration of The Queen's Golden Jubilee in television advertising, in producing the

crowned effigy of HM on the most attractive Jubilee 50-cent coin and for organizing not only a children's web site but also a series of Jubilee Teas to provide regional launches for the circulating halfdollar. Our enthusiasm is tempered, however, by two MACES.

MACE to the Royal Canadian Mint for part of its Communications Officer's astonishing reply to a member's suggestion it consider producing a coin in honour of The Queen Mother: "At the present time, there are no plans to mint a coin to celebrate the life of HM The Queen Mother, as this theme is more appropriate to the British Royal Mint." We have no difficulty accepting that the Mint, as any commercial operation, needs to assess its programme, and might or might not be in a position to craft and market such a coin – though we wish it would. But the astonishing suggestion that a Queen Mother coin is more appropriate to Britain is as perverse as it is wrong. The Queen Mother was Queen Consort of CANADA, the first Queen to visit CAN-ADA, deeply beloved by and affectionate to CANADIANS – and to do her honour is every bit as appropriate for the ROYAL Canadian Mint as for the British Royal Mint. Apparently Australia is indeed issuing such a coin - Australia! The hypocrisy of the RCM's reply is underscored as its Spring catalogue reveals it is issuing a 50-cent sterling coin as "a tribute to Princess Juliana." We respect and admire Princess Juliana - but how on earth is she a more worthy subject for a Canadian coin than our own Queen Mother? A complaint is issuing to the Master of the Mint.

Another MACE to the RCM for its press release announcing the Silver Dollar Jubilee coin – to be sure an attractive item worthy of our Mint's worldwide reputation – which stated "not since Her Majesty Queen Victoria has a British monarch reigned for 50 years," as for the arrogance of its PR flack's response to the Dominion Chairman's objection that surely the Royal CANADIAN Mint celebrating the Golden Jubilee of The Queen of CANADA with a CANADIAN coin should denominate The Queen as Sovereign of CANADA - or as logically call HM "Queen of Papua New Guinea" or "Queen of Barbados." Which provoked a reply from one "Phil Taylor, Communications" as follows: "The sentence to which your query refers is both semantically and grammatically accurate." Hardly the point!

FEDERAL INSTITUTIONS

CROWN to Canada Post for recognizing the difficulty in stocking ade-

quate supplies of the Golden Jubilee stamp of The Queen, and remedying it by ordering a reprint and ordering all postal outlets to carry it. This almost overcomes the tap of the Mace we had earlier reserved for CPC as a result of a December 3rd press release in which it described The Queen of Canada as "the fourth British Monarch" to attain her Golden Jubilee. True, but wouldn't "second Canadian Monarch" have been more helpful and to the point?

CROWN to the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, whose Protective Services Unit provided security throughout Prince Michael's visit. The Dominion Chair-



man wrote Cpl. Pierre LeBlanc at RCMP Headquarters as follows: "I wanted to let you know, as a Canadian, how I felt both very proud of and grateful for the assistance of the RCMP Protective Services during His Royal Highness' tour just ended. I knew the Officers would be well trained professionals; but I did not realize that each would prove to be so delightfully personable and helpful human beings, in addition. They were endlessly helpful, resourceful and patient - willing to go well beyond the call of duty, pick up a spare bag, give a lift, be visible when wanted and invisible when not – and I must especially mention Trevor here in Toronto in that respect. However, they were all wonderful people, and made my job - and more importantly, the Prince's passage through Canada – much smoother and more enjoyable. Please accept my thanks, and pass my appreciation on to all the Officers concerned: they rule!"

THE MEDIA

CROWN to the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation for outstanding and complete live coverage and film presentations on The Golden

Jubilee. The CBC's web site has also offered excellent comprehensive information on the subject. We should expect no less of our national broadcaster; but the acknowledgement of the role of Canada's Crown, and the popularity of the Monarchy amongst viewers, was not a feature of the Corporation's programming in the 70's and 80's.

MACE to the Halifax Daily News, other elements of the Halifax media and a self-aggrandizing, unknown but ambitious MLA, Bill Estabrooks, for their



relentless and ad hominem attacks on Nova Scotia Lieutenant Governor Myra Freeman. The character assassins of the Bluenose Province now focus their gimlet eyes on items such as

- expensive repair bills for Government House (the oldest Government House in the Commonwealth and thus a precious historic building where even the smallest wiring change is indeed costly);
- the cost of outside Christmas lighting decorations (the House is situated in the heart of Halifax – moreover, Her Honour's assisting downtown merchants and city fathers in celebration of a holiday not her own might better be considered civic boosterism, broad-minded and ecumenical);
- Her Honour's absence from services for Canadian casualties in Afghanistan (Her Honour was fully represented by the Administrator as is provided for in the Constitution while she undertook a longplanned trip to China which the cost of canceling and securing an immediate return would have provoked howls from the same quarters);
- Her Honour's not attending the 10th anniversary observance of the Westray mine disaster (Mrs Freeman was entertaining The King and Queen of Norway, a visit long planned and minutely arranged by the federal government, a diplomatic courtesy over which she had no control or choice whatsoever. Moreover, she was not invited to the disaster vigil);
- Her Honour's supposedly "Martha Stewart" style – simply a tribute to a Lieutenant Governor who tries to make sure that every Nova Scotian feels welcome in an elegant Vice-Regal home, which is no more "her mansion" than the White House

is George Bush's.

Those who make it their business in life to denigrate the best (and occasionally flawed) efforts of others must have hurt Mrs Freeman's feelings, perhaps even her standing amongst some elements of the population- mud sticks. But more Nova Scotians, we feel confident, admire her inclusivity in bringing so many and so diverse people and events to Government House, her ceaseless travels around the Province and her evident loyalty to The Queen, concern for the Office and the populace. Stick to your duty, Your Honour - and don't let the nay-sayers get you down!

CROWN to the seniors' periodical Forever Young, which celebrated the Jubilee in its March issue and placed a beautiful portrait of Her Majesty on its front cover.

CORPORATE CANADA

CROWN to Raymond Leach, Catering Services Manager of the Sheraton Centre Hotel, Toronto, who coordinated the innumerable details of HRH Prince Michael's accommodation during the Prince's five days in the GTA, as well as the Dominion Banquet tendered by the League. Mr Leach and his team were unflappable, courteous, professional and sophisticated - and it was a delight dealing with him and the Hotel, from the Doorman who retrieved the keys locked inside the Dominion Chairman's automobile to the bell and room service staff for whom nothing was too much trouble! Thank you!

MACE to The Great West Life Great West Life Insurance Company whose Winnipeg Headquarters – unlike nearly every other property-owner in the country – refused to lower the National Flag during the period of National Mourning for The Queen Mother, doing so only on the day of the Funeral.

THE LOYAL (?) SOCIETIES

MACE to The Royal Commonwealth Society Essay Competition organizers in Great Britain for ignoring the Golden Jubilee in its essay competition of many years' standing entered by children throughout the Commonwealth, and for its supine response to the Monarchist League of Canada's constructive criticism and suggested remedy. Chairman John Aimers wrote the Director-General at RCS Headquarters in London:

"...It seems incredible to me that the Royal Commonwealth Society, with its "Royal" designation, its Royal Patrons and its distinguished record of service to Crown and Commonwealth, would have completely ignored the Golden Jubilee of Her Majesty the Queen as affording a rich field of potential essay ideas about which both HM's young subjects in the Realms, and those who live in the Commonwealth republics, could profitably have written. Indeed, the only "Royal" reference is to conducting Prince William on a tour of one's country - not a bad topic as far as it goes - but one not at all linked to the Jubilee but rather to the Prince's wellknown "star" qualities.

"With the Jubilee's themes of celebration, service and community involvement providing a host of potential essay topics directly linked to The Queen's 50 years of giving to the Commonwealth and incarnating the Crown in all its diverse senses and roles, it does seem to me that the RCS has sadly missed the boat. It is a failure which both puzzles and deeply disappoints me. I shall await your explanation with interest and concern, and hope that, even now, you might issue a supplementary list of topics à la your "Commonwealth" topic which could be quickly distributed and promoted."

After consulting the Chief Examiner of the Competition, the Society's Director-General, Stuart Mole, replied:

"...At the outset, I ought to make clear that the Royal Commonwealth Society intends to mark the Golden Jubilee of Her Majesty The Queen in a number of highly significant ways, including through a special publication "Commonwealth of Nations" which will be distributed extensively around the Commonwealth. Apart from the Commonwealth Day celebrations (and the multi-faith Observance which The Queen will attend), other activities and initiatives are planned to express the Society's profound appreciation to Her Majesty for her role both as our Patron and as Head of the Commonwealth. That said, not all the activities of the RCS are necessarily appropriate mechanisms for celebrating the Golden Jubilee, and this is the view we took of the Commonwealth Essay Competition, for two reasons.

First, the examiners have found through past experience that, by and large, questions about the Royal Family have not been successful in generating entries or encouraging writing which is creative and informed. The question for 2002 on Prince William was crafted with this consideration in mind. Second, one of the principal purposes of the Competition is to promote the modern Commonwealth, its principles and its programmes. It is a regrettable fact that, almost universally, there is little public understanding of the distinction between The Queen's role as Head of the Commonwealth and her duties as Queen of her various realms. In some countries such as Australia, and to an extent Canada - where there is any kind of domestic debate about the constitutional position of The Queen as the Head of State, there is room for misunderstanding and confusion unless the distinction is made very clear. In our view, the Essay Competition is not a suitable channel for seeking to clarify this distinction, which is why we decided not to include a question on the Golden Jubilee..."

If indeed there is "little public understanding" or even "misunderstanding and confusion" about any of The Queen's roles vis a vis Commonwealth and Realms, one would have imagined that the Royal Commonwealth Society, operating throughout the Commonwealth, would have been precisely the organization to rectify the situation via the supporting material accompanying an educational venture such as a world-wide essay competition for students, rather than resort to the reductionist argument, above, which merely serves to perpetuate the unhappy situation, and casts a shadow of valueless defeatism over a hithertoproud organization. God help us if such is to be the attitude of "loyal societies."

While the Canadian RCS, with which the League enjoys frequent positive contacts, has not taken any public stand on the controversy, its President Dr. Peter Meinecke did contact the Dominion Chairman and courteously offer to bring forward the matter to Headquarters' attention.

MACE to elements in the IODE who as the



result of the ever-pernicious recommendations of that tool of modern marketing and vacuity of principle "the focus group," have managed to inveigle the venerable and loyal charitable women's organization remove an affirmation of Loyalty to the Sovereign from its practice and ritual. Societies which seek to adjust their raison d'être to become more "relevant" generally lose the hard-won credibility built up – in the case of IODE – since 1900. It is no secret that the group has been hemmoraghing members (IODE's membership has fallen from 38,000 in its heyday to only 7,000 today), as rural populations shrink, along with the class of full-time women volunteers who used to be the backbone of so many voluntary societies. But the revival of a definite mission and sticking to founding ideals is more apt to produce a strengthened membership than this lamentable abandonment of loyalty passed at the National AGM on a 3/5ths vote by fewer than 200 of the remaining members.

CROWN to Canadian Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children's Dr E.T. Barker, who graciously acknowledged a number of donations made to the organization in memory of Princess Margaret by writing Her Majesty – the Princess was Patron of the equivalent group in the UK.

LOYAL CANADIANS

CROWN to Pierre Trepanier, an Ottawa member of The Monarchist League of Canada, who established the Golden Jubilee exhibition depicted [below] in the display case of Devonshire Community Public School attended by one of his children. If every Canadian



sought out a school in which to mount a similar commemoration this Fall, the effect on HM's youngest subjects would be incalculably good.

ACADEME

MACE to the University of British Columbia, which refuses to sing The Royal Anthem at Convocation on the basis of "protocol" advice that it is



correctly sung in Canada in the presence of members of The Royal Family. Silly UBC! Protocol merely dictates what should be done in official circumstances; it does not proscribe anything! By UBC's application of cold logic, "God Save the Queen" would be seldom sung in the Dominion – not, for instance, sung at all during the nationwide chain of memorial services for The Queen Mother; not once during the countless Jubilee observances stretching coast to coast to coast prior to The Queen's arrival; never at school assemblies. The University's position is patent nonsense and reductionist republicanism of a low order. The Royal Anthem is correctly sung in Canada whenever and wherever loyal souls gather and wish to sing it. A pox on such pseudo-academic babble!

In April 1998, Dr. Williams participated in STS-90 as Mission Specialist 3 aboard Space Shuttle *Columbia*. During the 16-day flight, called Neurolab, the seven- person crew served as both experiment subjects and operators for 26 individual life science experiments. Dr. Williams was appointed director of the Space and Life Sciences Directorate at the Johnson Space Centre in Houston, Texas in July 1998. He is the first non-American to hold a senior management position with NASA.

HALIFAX, November 21 – Nova Scotia became the latest Province to unveil its Honours System, the Order of Nova Scotia. At a Government House ceremony, the Lieutenant Governor and Premier unveiled the

insignia of the medal recipients will receive. The medal's insignia depicts the province's symbols, including the Shield of Arms, the mayflower – the province's floral symbol – and the St. Edward's Crown.

"We are fortunate to have so many citizens who have distinguished themselves and brought honour and prestige to our province in many fields of endeavour," said Tourism & Culture Minister Rodney MacDonald. "Given the endless list of possible candidates, we have not established specific categories in the selection process, and the only path to an Order of Nova Scotia will be through merit." An non-partisan Advisory Committee has been established to review all nominations and recommend the appointment of members. In the first year, 10 Nova Scotians will be awarded the medal, and up to five annually thereafter.

SCHLIERSEE, BAVARIA, November 24 – Princess George of Hanover, last surviving sister of The Duke of



Prince Andrew of Greece, Princess Alice and their children. Princess George stands behind her father.

Edinburgh, died in a nursing home near the Austro-German border. Godmother to the Earl of Wessex and a frequent visitor to Royal homes in the UK, the Princess often spent summers at Balmoral. With her husband, Prince George, grandson of the Kaiser, she attended The Golden Wedding Service for The Queen and Prince Philip at Westminister Abbey in 1997. Born Princess Sophie, she remained close to her brother, and in 1994 she accompanied him to Jerusalem to witness their Mother Princess Alice of Battenberg being honoured as Righteous for having hid a Jewish family in her Athens flat during World War II.



After being evacuated by air from Bagshot Park, The Countess of Wessex underwent an emergency operation for an ectopic pregnancy at King Edward VII Hospital. An ectopic pregnancy occurs when the foetus develops in a fallopian tube rather than the womb. As a result, both Mother and child are at risk. In a state-

ment from her bed, Sophie said "I am obviously very sad. But it was just not meant to be. There will be other chances." The Earl remained at Buckingham Palace to be close to his wife's side throughout the painful ordeal.



LONDON, December 12-15 new Canadian watercolours were addded to The Queen's collection to be displayed at Windsor Castle. They were chosen by a jury of the Cana-

dian Society of Painters in Water Colour, and accepted by The Prince of Wales at Canada House on the Queen's behalf. Amongst artists represented are Alice Reed of Antigonish, NS; Ron Hazell of Brookside, NS; and Toronto artist Ross Monk. The Queen now owns some 75 Canadian watercolours. "It gradually dawned on me, what makes it so interesting is that it records the minutiae of people's lives," the Prince said. "This makes it so special."

OTTAWA, December 13 – The Prime Minister defended HE John Ralston Saul from criticism by the Canadian Alliance of views expressed in his new book On Equilibrium. Acting Opposition Leader John Reynolds had criticized Mr Saul for suggesting the West was partially responsible for the September 11 attacks, and for characterizing President Bush's initial response as "frail and weak." M. Chretien told reporters that His Excellency "is not the Governor General and he has the freedom of speaking... He is not a member of the Cabinet and has a right to express himself the way he wants." He went on to observe "No doubt about it, he is a controversial person at times. But we have Madame Clarkson - she is the Governor General and she is doing a very excellent job." Writing on December 20th in The Globe & Mail, Professor Andrew Cohen explained attacks on the Governor General and her spouse as actuated by "the scribbling accountants of envy," and he extoled their work as having made the vice-regal office "a fulcrum of creativity and an emblem of pride... Thoughtful people can differ over the appropriate role of the spouse of a governor-general. In this case, the Prime Minister, the leader of the Conservative Party and the head of the Monarchist League supported Mr Saul. That seemed lost in the spirited assault on Mr Saul." In the same newspaper, columnist Hugh Winsor responded to Monarchist Chairman John Aimers' defence of Saul by observing "It must certainly be a turning point in the arcane dialogue about the status of the vice- regal consort when even the Monarchist League ignores the spluttering."



TORONTO, December 16 – Pauline McGibbon, first woman vice-regal representative in the Commonwealth when she was appointed Lieutenant Governor of Ontario in 1974, died in Toronto aged 91. The native of Sarnia was a dedicated volunteer, who returned to the Treasury 95% of her annual salary as Queen's representative.

LONDON, December 16 – The British Royal Mint unveiled a £5 coin to honour The Queen's Golden Jubilee. The Crown features an equestrian portrait of HM on one side, with a "reflective" contemporary profile on the other. The inscription reads *Amor Populae Praesidium Reg* – "The Love of the People is The Queen's Protection." The circulating version of the coin will be released in May 2002.

LONDON, December 21 – Lucian Freud's tiny but striking new portrait of The Queen provoked strong reactions as it was unveiled in the run-up to the Jubilee. The Daily Telegraph agreed that it was "extremely un-



flattering" but went on to observe "this is a picture of a woman who takes her duty extremely seriously, who has suffered but who is determined not to allow her suffering to get the better of her," and to conclude that people will argue about the work as they did when the now-classic Annigoni portrait was first displayed – saying that the Freud one is "every bit as good." National Post editorialized that "Freud has brilliantly captured fundamental elements of The Queen's character: her strength and authority, her stoicism and the marks of long life's cares... a reservoir of knowledge and understanding." By no means the most ringing dissenting opinion came from the Editor of The British Art Journal, who remarked "It makes her look like one of the Royal corgis which has suffered a stroke." Monarchist League Dominion Chairman John Aimers commented to the media in verse:

"Now Lucian Freud's 'painted' The Queen Whom we know for visage serene; His horror says less About Royal stress Than it does of court artists: vain, mean."

KENSINGTON PALACE, December 25 – Princess Alice, Duchess of Gloucester, widow of Prince Henry of

Gloucester, who was fourth in line to the Throne at the time of their Marriage in 1935, marked her 100th Birthday. The Royal Family had celebrated the oc-



casion at Kensington Palace on December 12. The Dowager Duchess is described as physically well but afflicted by difficulties with her memory.

BUCKINGHAM PALACE, January 1 – The Queen's New Year's Honours List named Ernest Dennis, Chief Steward to Ontario's Lieutenant Governors for 20 years, as recipient of The Royal Victorian Medal (Silver). Ernie, as he is known

The Royal Victorian Order and Medals, instituted by Queen Victoria, are in the personal gift of The Queen, and awarded to those who serve the Crown directly.



LONDON, January 1 - In a listener poll to determine Britain's greatest monarch, conducted by Radio 4's Today programme, the 10,000 voters gave Elizabeth I top place with 31%; Eliz-

abeth II finished just behind at 27%. The remaining finalists included Alfred The Great (26%), Henry II (9%) and Victoria (7%).

LONDON, January 9 - It was announced that Princess Madeleine of Sweden, third in line to the Throne, quit her English studies in London and returned to Stockholm because of incessant harassment by paparazzi.

RIDEAU HALL, January 14 - The Governor General announced 96 appointments to The Order of Canada. Former federal NDP leader Ed Broadbent was named a Companion, while amongst the new Members were hockey great "Red" Kelly, communications guru Phil Lind and artist Ken Danby.

WINDSOR, January 24 - In honour of the Golden Jubilee, a new landscape garden is to be created at Windsor Castle, the first to be made there in 200 years. Due to be completed in June, the garden will stretch from the main gates to St George's Gates on Castle Hill, familiar to visitors as their entrance point. Centrepiece will be a bandstand of English stone, which will provide the setting for regular performances by the Bands of the Household Division.

SANDRINGHAM, January 31 - The Queen granted a unique Royal Warrant – "By Appointment to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II Mole Controller" to Victor Williamson, who spends three days a week trying to

control moles on the Sovereign's 20,000-acre estate.



AMSTERDAM, February 2 – A quarter million lined the streets to celebrate the marriage of Crown Prince Willem-Alexander Maxima Zorreguieta. Polls reported a threefold increase

in support for the nuptials, originally clouded by media focus on the bride's father, a Minister in the former Argentinian Junta who did not attend the wedding.

OTTAWA, February 4 -Only the reaction of "focus groups" saved the word "Canadian" and the Royal Crown on the Canadian Forces logo, says a Department of National Defence

report. DND had considered dropping these elements from its logo, considering them "stodgy" and "outdated," and the Crown "a major irritant" making some respondents wonder if Canada was "subservient to Britain," in favour of one word "Forces," with the "O" being turned into a Crest or Maple Leaf. Further redesign proposals remain under consideration.

BUCKINGHAM PALACE, February 13 – The Queen presented former New York Mayor Rudy Giuliani with the Insignia of a Knight Commander of the Order of the British Empire, "for services after the September 11th

tragedy." Her Majesty and Mr Giuliani chatted for several minutes; afterwards he paid tribute to The Queen's "tremendous support" and said "We have no better friends than Great Britain."

LONDON, February 13 - Historian John Keegan warned that there remain only 18 living holders of the Victoria Cross (of whom but one is Canadian, Ernest "Smokey" Smith) and that the pre-eminent decoration for supreme bravery in the face of the enemy may be at risk of dying out.

DUBLIN, February 14 - The Prince of Wales presented New Year's Honours to five citizens of Ireland, the first time such honours have been presented by a member of the Royal Family in the Republic since partition and creation of the Irish Free State in 1922.

EDMONTON, February 14 - The death was announced of the Hon. H.A. "Bud" Olson, one of Alberta's most unhappy choices as Lieutenant Governor. A former Cabinet Minister and Senator, Mr Olson undertook few engagements during his time as HM's representative in the Province, and engaged in an unseemly public row with his predecessor about the location and funding of the annual New Year's Levee.

Saul said "the real possibility of a serious export market is at hand."



LONDON, March 2 - The Earl and Countess of Wessex announced that they will relinquish their careers in order to take up Royal duties on a full-time basis. In informing a Duke of Edin-

burgh's Award Conference of their decision, Prince Edward said that "It is quite obvious in this year, the Golden Jubilee, we are required, more than ever, to support The Queen and to help my family shoulder some of the increasing responsibilities and workload into the future."

QUEEN'S PARK, March 7 – A diplomat with First Nations roots, most recently Canada's Ambassador to the European Union, James Bartleman was sworn in as Ontario's 41st viceregal representative. The 62-year old Lieutenant

Governor told the audience at his Installation "As a Canadian with aboriginal as well as white roots, I bring a particular regard for the positive role which the Crown has played in aboriginal affairs over the centuries." In addition to raising the profile of Aboriginal issues, Mr Bartleman is expected to champion mental health causes: he has suffered from Depression since he was robbed and beaten while representing Canada in South Africa. "A message of inclusion in the halls of power," ran an editorial in the Orillia Packet & Times welcoming the appointment.


LONDON, March 11 – In a speech to editors marking the 300th anniversary of the founding of the first daily national newspaper, The Prince of Wales thanked them for the way they had treated his sons. "I do want to underline my own very real gratitude and, indeed, surprise, for the manner in which all newspapers have sought to give my two sons, William and Harry, as much privacy as is possible in their position: a position which is, of course, not one they have chosen for themselves. Growing up is not easy – When was it, I wonder? – but I suspect our modern world makes it even more difficult and they, along with others, have been through times of immense difficulty and tragedy. But they have been able to do so much of the time in relative privacy, and they, and I, continue to be very grateful that they have been allowed a measure of peace."



MARLBOROUGH HOUSE, March 12 – A new portrait of the Queen unveiled been Commonwealth Secretary-General Don McKinnon. The monarch's full-length, vibrantly coloured likeness was commissioned by the Commonwealth in celebration of HM's Golden Jubilee. The Queen, dressed in royal blue, is depicted standing against a backdrop of images from Commonwealth

nations – Victoria Falls in Zimbabwe, the Sydney Opera House in Australia, the Taj Mahal in India, the Houses of Parliament in London, Montego Bay in Jamaica and a totem pole from British Columbia in Canada. The Nigerian-born artist, Chinwe Chukwuogo-Roy, lives in Suffolk. "The Queen is a great communicator," she said. "She's observant, humorous, interesting and generous with her time. I hope I have succeeded in capturing some of these qualities in my painting."

OTTAWA, March 19 - After discussion on the issue spanning 19 years, The Senate by voice vote passed Bill S-34, to amend the way by which The Royal Assent is given in The Queen's Name, allowing for a declaration of Assent by The Governor General, and prescribing at least two traditional in-Chamber ceremony in each calendar year, including the first Appropriation Bill to be passed by Parliament. The Bill was first amended on the suggestion of Sen Grafstein to permit at least one member of each House to be present when Her Excellency gave private Assent. The Bill received Second Reading in the House of Commons on April 19th with all parties speaking in support. Peter MacKay (PC-Pictou-Antigonish-Guysborough) speaking for the Tories, acknowledged the Monarchist League's opposition to the Bill. It was then referred to the Standing Committee on Procedure and House Affairs. That Committee reported the Bill to the House of Commons on May 9th, where, after brief debate, it passed, subsequently receiving The Royal Assent on May 31st. [Ed – See 'From Parliament Hill, p. 20]



HIGHGROVE, March 19 – The Prince of Wales was said to be deeply upset at the death of his 18-year old Jack Russell terrier, Tigga. The dog was given as a puppy to the Prince by Lady Salisbury, and was rarely absent from his side. Tigga first came to gen-

eral notice when in 1994 his daughter, Pooh, mysteriously disappeared during a walk at Balmoral.

ST ANDREW'S UNIVERSITY, March 28 – Due to Prince William's attendance, it was reported by the Scottish Higher Education Funding Council that applications to the Scottish University have shot up by 44% last year, "with many of the approaches coming from American women." A dramatic increase in local housing prices was also attributed to the Prince's presence in the Fife community.



KLOSTERS, March 30 – The Prince of Wales joshed with his two sons and a party of friends at the start of a Swiss skiing holiday subsequently cut short by news of The Queen Mother's death. Prince William, 19, told media he was finding university life

"very good fun," and that he would be trying snow-boarding for the first time, to which Charles observed "I know when I'm too old for something".

LONDON, March 30 – In an interview marking the 20th Anniversary of the Argentine Invasion of the Falklands, The Duke of York said that his war experiences had given him a deep understanding of courage, sacrifice and camaraderie. "It was dirty; it was exhausting; it was monotonous; people really bled and death might be a consequence," he wrote. "It was nearly 99 per cent routine business and one per cent sheer terror. I suffered the same feelings of fear and uncertainty as did the rest of my colleagues."

LONDON, April 9 – Asked, in French, while in London for The Funeral of The Queen Mother about the Monarchy's role in Canada, the Prime Minister replied: "It's not a problem now because we have a governorgeneral who is named by the prime minister and is a citizen of Canada ... The system works well. Perhaps from a theoretical point of view, [there is] a problem, but not from a practical viewpoint."



Camilla Parker Bowles joined the Prince of Wales and Royal Family for the first time at Divine Worship at Crathie Parish Church. Mrs Bowles had also attended The Queen Mother's Funeral, although she was not seated with the Prince.

BALMORAL, April 14

OTTAWA, April 15 – In an interview with The Hill Times, Government House Leader Ralph Goodale suggested that the current Session of Parliament might be prorogued in the Fall, with a Speech from The Throne being delivered by The Queen during her Jubilee Homecoming to Canada.

WINDSOR CASTLE, April 17 – As part of the Golden Jubilee celebrations, The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh gave a Dinner Party for the Governors-General of Her Majesty's Realms, at which The Prince of Wales, The Duke of York, The Earl & Countess of Wessex and The Princess Royal & Commodore Timothy Laurence, RN, were present. The vice-regal guests subsequently joined The Royal Family on April 18th at the Memorial Service for Princess Margaret.



KABUL, April 18 – Former King Mohammad Zahir Shah returned to Afghanistan after 29 years in exile. The Shah, under heavy guard, will assist in the summoning and debate of a *loya jirga*, an assembly of all tribes in the war-torn country, in an attempt to build new leadership and governance structures

LONDON, April 18 – On hearing the news of the tragic deaths and injuries to members of HM Canadian Forces serving in Afghanistan, Her Excellency The Governor General immediately issued a statement in which she said, "We know that our soldiers are courageous and prepared for the trial and risks of conflict... The impact of the deaths and severe wounding of our soldiers touches us all in a personal way. I know from meeting and talking with them how much military families sacrifice and endure for the sake of service to our country. With all Canadians, my heart goes out to them and their regiment at this terrible time, as together, we all mourn." Their Excellencies then flew to Germany to comfort the wounded soldiers at Ramstein.

CAMBERLEY, April 20 – The Countess of Wessex carried out her first solo official engagement as a Member of the Royal Family when she visited with teachers and children at a community nursery's Spring Fair in this Surrey town.









LONDON, April 24 – A set of memorial stamps honouring The Queen Mother went on sale today at the British Post Office.

EDMONTON, April 28 – The Governor General delivered the eulogy at the Memorial Ceremony for the Fallen Dead of 3PPCLI. "They have given their lives for us, for our way of life, for our peaceable kingdom. They have given their lives in a far away land for people they did not know. They have written their names in our hearts. That is what they have given us... that monument which stays with us is more enduring than stone, greater than the place in which their bodies lie. We know that heroes have the whole earth for their tomb. We have brought them home. They will be part of our future, not our past."

LONDON, April 29-30 – The Queen dined at 10 Downing Street with the living Prime Ministers and family members of deceased Prime Ministers who have served her during her Reign. The following day she opened official Golden Jubilee celebrations by addressing Parliament in a ceremony at Westminster Hall. Nixing speculation of abdication in favour of The Prince of Wales, HM said: "I would like above all to declare my resolve to continue, with the support of my family, to serve the people of this great nation of ours to the best of my ability through the changing times ahead."

OTTAWA, April 30 – Former Private Secretary to Governors General Hnyatshyn, LeBlanc and Clarkson, Judith LaRocque, currently Associate Deputy Minister of Canadian Heritage, was appointed Deputy Minister of Canadian Heritage.

THE BARBADOS, May 1 – Prime Minister Owen Arthur announced that in the face of public opposition, plans to hold a referendum about abolishing the Monarchy had been dropped.

HALIFAX, May 8 – The Government of Nova Scotia announced that a new course in Canadian History, in development for several years, will become compulsory for all students wish to attain high school graduation, and be introduced in September 2002.

LONDON, May 8 – A Corporate Edge survey shows that Britons under 30 much prefer the symbols of "Old" Britain such as the Royal Family and Buckingham Palace to the trappings of "Cool Britannia." 75% want The Queen's head to remain on stamps, and Prince William was by far the first choice as the best ambassador for Britain. Asked to name "an icon of nationhood," two-thirds responded Buckingham

Palace. A Lion and Ali G outdistanced Tony Blair as choice for depiction on stamps as alternative to HM

LONDON, May 12 - Mayor Ken Livingstone announced that a committee appointed by him does not recommend that the London memorial to The Queen Mother occupy the vacant fourth plinth at Trafalgar Square, the subject of much debate over the years. It prefers a changing display of contemporary art on the site. The East End – as tribute to her and the King's courage during the War years - or Clarence House her London residence into which The Prince of Wales is expected to move – are now favoured locations for the memorial.

LONDON, May 14 – The Royal Family celebrated The Queen's becoming a great-aunt as Viscountess Linley gave birth to a baby girl at Portland Hospital. The child, 13th in line to the Throne, would have been Princess Margaret's grand-daughter as her father is David – Viscount Linley – the respected cabinet maker.

RIDEAU HALL, May 17 – The Governor General presided at the inaugural investiture of three Commanders, six Officers and 14 Members of the Order of Merit of the Police Forces. The Order was created by The Queen in 2000 in order to recognize "conspicuous merit and exceptional service" amongst Canadian police.

LONDON, May 22 – The Daily Telegraph reported that Princess Michael of Kent had expressed to its reporter he bitterness over media treatment of Prince Michael and her son Frederick, who it had been widely reported, had held a raucous party at Kensington Palace amidst the Lying in State of The Queen Mother. In fact, said the Princess, Lord Frederick had canceled a previously-scheduled party out of respect for Queen Elizabeth and instead invited a few friends for a spaghetti dinner.

The 2001 ten-cent piece design was amended from the traditional schooner design in order to commemorate the United Nations declaration of the International Year of Volunteers. Please note that the traditional design will return to its previous configuration as of 2002."

MONARCHIST LEAGUE MEMBERS ATTEND ROYAL GARDEN PARTIES

Geoff Little, a former League Intern to Ontario's Lieutenant Governor, studied for a year at the University of Birmingham. When not engaged in pushing vicars and pensioners out of the way, he attends Trinity College, University of Toronto. Geoff kindly supplied the text of his exciting afternoon at the Palace, while Windsor members Dick and Donalda Robarts shared with CMN their photo recollecting the memorable event.

...the queue outside the Palace gates was rather long. I got there at about 2.30 and chatted with some rather nice New Zealanders. The gates opened at 3 pm and the queue moved into the palace quadrangle then into a long entrance room on the ground floor then into a sort of reception room that went into the gardens. To use the term gardens, however, would be an understatement since they covered the area of a large park. Coming out of the Palace into the gardens, there was a huge tea tent on the left (for regular invitees) and two smaller ones on the right (Royal and diplomatic). There were also two military bands playing, oddly enough show tunes. In my opinion, too much Les Miz, too little Oliver but I'm not complaining. I wandered around for about 20 minutes until they started serving tea. And boy did they serve tea. Cakes, sandwiches, fruit cake, ice cream, lemonade. It was rather hot for tea but I had some anyway, just to say I did. As I was finishing my second cup, I noticed that people were forming a sort of lane in the middle of the garden. Being keen, I decided to join it since I thought (correctly) that the Queen would eventually pass that way. I had to push several vicars and pensioners out

of the way, but I got to the front in the end. The Queen and the Duke of Edinburgh were scheduled to arrive at 4pm so I stood in a hot and testy line for about half and hour. We

shared a nervous laugh. At 4, that magical hour, the band suddenly started playing the (British) National Anthem, and the Queen and the Duke appeared at the top of the garden steps. Slowly, she made her way down the laneway, stopping to talk to members of the diplomatic corps who were standing in the middle of the laneway waiting to be presented. I did see the Queen and, to my delight, HM asked my section of the lane if we were having a nice time. We all told her we were, God bless her. Her Majesty is very small and tiny even

in high heeled shoes. She had on a royal blue dress with a coat and a blue and white hat (I feel like a writer for a 50s film star magazine but I'm sure you're all hanging on my every word). It was about 30 degrees in the sun as well. To be honest, it really was a wonderful moment. You see her on tv and in the papers and she looks exactly the same, but there's something magical about seeing her in person. I suppose it also has to do with the concept of monarchy in general, the idea that you're seeing YOUR queen. After she passed my section of the lane I went back to the tea tent for some well deserved refreshment. Was that the end of my magical day, you ask? Oh, no. I was walking around, humming along with the band (then playing Georgie Girl)when an equerry approached me and asked me, out of the blue, if I wanted to meet Princess Alexandra. Did I? Oh, yes. So, he took down my name and details and what not and I waited for a few minutes until the Princess (for those who don't know, the Queen's cousin and quite a hard worker)came over and we had a chat about Canada and Birmingham and so on. Delightful! I also saw the Duke of Edinburgh (Prince Philip) and the Duke of Kent (Princess Alexandra's brother and the Queen's cousin). Prince Andrew was supposedly there but I didn't see him and I did try. While the Royal Family was having tea in the Royal Tent I strolled around the grounds, smelling roses and listening in to other people's conversations. I lined up again to see the Queen leave and I joined in a hearty 'hurray' to see her off. I also stole a teaspoon from the tea tent as a souvenir. Don't tell anyone. I left



the way I came, through the large room leading into the entrance room, through the quad, then out the front gates. I had my photograph taken (for 20 pounds, rip off. Cameras aren't allowed in the Palace) so I expect to see myself wearing a top hat and dopey smile on 8"x10" glossies soon. I will autograph them and give them out as Christmas gifts. If I had been hit by a car the minute I left the palace I would have died a happy death and would have been able to delight God with the story I just told you.

GOVERNOR GENERAL HOSTS FIRST YOUTH FORUM

As part of the 50th anniversary celebration of Canadian Governors General, Her Excellency the Right Honourable Adrienne Clarkson and His Excellency John Ralston Saul brought together over 100 Canadian high school students to Rideau Hall from February 12 to 17, 2002 for the first-ever Governor General's Youth Forum.

"As we have traveled the country over the past two years, John Ralston Saul and I have been awe-struck by the young people we have met. Whether in schools, 4-H clubs or volunteering in countless organizations, Canada's youth bring incredible energy, new ideas and impressive engagement to their communities and to the challenges they face," said the Governor General in announcing the forum. "We want to tap into that, share it among young people from all over Canada."

The four-day forum included youth delegates from every part of the country, from high schools in small, rural towns and reserves to large urban cities. The students were chosen based on their demonstration of community involvement, their leadership qualities, a passion for one or more community activities and their reasons for attending the forum.

The goal of the forum was to hear what today's youth has to say about building and encouraging community involvement in their hometowns. They spoke with the Governor General and His Excellency John Ralston Saul about what community means to them, sharing their own experiences about the contributions they have already made in their communities, identifying challenges they have faced and exchanging ideas for solutions to getting more young people involved.

In a panel discussion with CBC Radio's Anthony Germain, some of the forum delegates presented their own stories, which were heard on *The House*. Vanessa Reid of Montreal's Santropol Roulant was invited to speak about the unique intergenerational approach that her organization takes in providing community service.

On the last day of the forum, the Ballroom at Rideau Hall became the location of a Town Hall discussion among delegates, led by the Governor General and John Ralston Saul. The delegates reviewed some of the key concepts that came about at the forum, and how they could be applied to communities throughout Canada. The hour-and-a-half discussion was broadcast live on CBC Newsworld.

The Governor General will build on the Forum discussions by involving delegates in the organization of activities and roundtables in their communities which coincide with the Governor General's regional visits. The forum was part of the yearlong celebrations marking the 50th anniversary of the appointment of the first Canadian Governor General, the Right Honourable Vincent Massey.

The House Remembers The Queen Mother: Bloc Proposes Amendment to Condolence Motion – April 9, 2002

The Speaker: Order, please. As today is a day of national mourning, I would ask that hon. members rise for a minute of silence in honour of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother.

[Editor's Note: The House stood in silence] Hon. Sheila Copps (for the Prime Minister) moved:

That a humble Address be presented to Her Majesty the Queen in the following words:

TO THE QUEEN'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY:

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN:

We, Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled, approach Your Majesty with the expression of our deep and heartfelt sorrow at the demise of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother.

We mourn the loss of Her Majesty whose kindness, graciousness and influence for good over so many years won the love, respect and admiration of us all, and there has come to each of us a sense of personal bereavement which, we say with all possible respect and duty, makes Your Majesty's sorrow our own.

We pray that the God of consolation may comfort Your Majesty and the members of the Royal Family in your bereavement, and that Your Majesty may long be spared to continue the eminent public services of your great predecessors.

That the said Address be engrossed;

That a Message be sent to the Senate informing their Honours that this House has passed the said Address and requesting their Honours to unite with this House therein.

Mr. Speaker, the life of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, spanned the entire 20th century, a century of immense upheaval and great change. That entire time, the Queen Mother has been a symbol of courage, stability and dignity, and of constant devotion to her loyal subjects. Not only did she live through so much of our modern history, she was also a key figure in it... The Canadian crown has lost a part of itself and the Canadian family now mourns one of our own. Canadians are deeply saddened by the loss of Her Majesty. In an ever changing world, she was truly a symbol of enduring strength and stability and service to humankind. We shall miss her.

Ms. Francine Lalonde: Mr. Speaker, I wanted to read it at the beginning, out of respect for this assembly, so that my speech would be understood. My motion is:

That the motion be amended by replacing everything after the words "the following words" by the following:

"We, the House of Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled, wish to extend to Her our condolences on the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, the Queen Mother, who, with her husband, King George VI, was able to rally the British nation, particularly during the dark days of World War II."

Right Hon. Joe Clark (Calgary Centre, PC/DR):

If the House may allow one personal recollection, in May 1979 one of those rare and extraordinary events occurred in Canada. A general election actually changed the Government of Canada. The Queen Mother had an event in Halifax to which invitations had been issued well before election day. To say that the invitation list did not reflect the election result would be to understate the case.

My spouse, Maureen McTeer, attended the Queen Mother's reception and events on my behalf. That was a time when Maureen McTeer's own use of her own name was not universally approved. Several of the guests at the luncheon, coming from both another party and another time, delighted in referring to Maureen consistently as Mrs. Clark. Not the Queen Mother. As Maureen walked her to her car, the Queen Mother touched her arm and said "I always tell my grandchildren that they must be themselves and do what they believe is best in life. Just be yourself". Then she said "Don't let them get you down, Ms. McTeer".

The Queen Mother was a powerful and courageous symbol. She was a wonderful and sensitive person. We extend to the Royal Family our most sincere sympathies and our prayers during this time of sadness.

The amendment failed 19-144 and the Main Motion passed 145-19 in what must be the first occasion in Canadian Parliamentary history on which such a matter has been the subject of a recorded vote.

The Royal Assent Bill

From Proceedings of the Standing Committee of the House of Commons on Procedure and House Affairs – May 9, 2002

Mr. John Reynolds (West Vancouver-Sunshine Coast, Canadian Alliance):

I won't hold up very long. I really have just one question. The summary prepared by our researcher points out that many details are still missing in the bill. For example, it's unknown whether representatives of the government and the opposition in both the Senate and the House could be in attendance when the bill is presented to the Governor General, and whether the ceremony would be in public. There are also suggestions that the Prime Minister could be in attendance. We want to know about holding these ceremonies outside of Ottawa and inviting school children to attend, or things like that. That's being considered. Are any of the details worked out, or are they still all up in the air? Who will decide those things once the bill is passed?

Mr. Ron Wall (Director, Parliamentary Operations, Legislation and House Planning, Privy Council Office): The government has had informal discussions with the Table, in the House and in the Senate, and with the Governor Gen-

eral's office about this. The attendance would be subject to the importance of the bill, if there were a written procedure ceremony. The bill provides for attendance by members of the House and of the Senate.

The details of the ceremony would be subject to the importance of the bill, the interests of Parliament, of the government, and of the Governor General. If a written procedure ceremony were to be desired, it's certainly possible; at the same time, if a bill were of great significance, the case was made in the Senate that it would probably be an opportunity for the usual traditional ceremony to be used.

The Prime Minister's attendance was raised at the committee stage in the Senate, as was the participation of the Governor General, and the leader of the government in the House and in the Senate made undertakings to the com-

mittee that every effort would be made to encourage the attendance of ministers, including the Prime Minister, the Governor General, and members of Parliament. By having longer-term planning for traditional ceremonies, we would be able to promote that.

Mr. John Reynolds: My only point is it would be a very good idea, if you had a bill that had significance in Saskatchewan, British Columbia, or Atlantic Canada, that you might want to do it there, just to bring Parliament a little closer to the people. As long as it's being done in a way that's equitable — not just the Prime Minister or the Governor General going off to do a political show, but members from all parties being there to see a bill passed — I think it would be very good.

The Chair: Can I ask, is that possible? A voice: Yes.

The Chair: Yes? That's good; thank you.

A MEMBER'S MEMORY – HOW I RECEIVED ROYAL CLEMENCY

When Princess Elizabeth and the Duke of Edinburgh visited Canada in 1951, I was a very new Midshipman serving in the cruiser, HMCS Ontario. We had sailed from Esquimalt, BC to escort the Princess and the Duke from Charlottetown to St. Johns, Newfoundland via Sydney, NS. The night before the Princess arrived in Charlottetown the Midshipmen had been at a dance at the Yacht Club. As we came back on board the Officer of the Watch informed us that our leave was stopped for a month by the Captain. On enquiring as to what we had done to receive such a terrible punishment we were told that it was because we were seen necking on the dance floor!! The Captain's definition of necking was dancing cheek to cheek!

I was appointed the Duke's "Doggie". My duties were to stand on guard outside the cabin and run any messages the Duke or the Princess required. As I stood there my best friend Midshipman Campbell came up to me and whis-

pered "had I heard of Royal clemency"? I said "No". He explained that the King could get you off hanging through Royal clemency and that perhaps the Princess could get us off "stoppage of leave". I said "don't be crazy!". Off he went but he arrived back about 20 minutes later and walked right by me and up to the Princess and the Duke who were sitting on the sofa and said, "Ma'am, Your Royal Highness, I would like to request Royal clemency for 9 midshipmen who are under stoppage of leave for necking in Charlottetown." The Princess looked somewhat taken aback and turned to the Duke who said "Snotty, if Royal clemency were granted to the Midshipman it would have to be granted to all the officers and men under punishment in HMCS Ontario. Go away and we will think about it".

The next day over the ship's broadcast system it was announced that the Princess in the name of the King was pleased to grant Royal clemency to all Officers and men under punishment in HMCS Ontario. A cheer went up through the ship at this good news.

On another occasion the Princess and the Duke toured the ship visiting the Chief and Petty Officers and men's messes. The Princess was at the head of the touring party with the Duke behind. As the tour was ending the Duke was passing the Wardroom and said he would like to try a Canadian beer. So in he went. The Princess in the meantime proceeded on to the Quarterdeck which had no cover, and there was a light drizzle. She stood at the hatch going down to her cabin waiting for the Duke. In the meantime the Duke told me to take a message to the Princess that he had been unavoidably detained. I marched off and as I approached the Princess she knew I had a message from the Duke, and she had a very icy look in her eye. I gave her the message, and she stared at me and stamped her foot and said, "Isn't that just like a man" and rapidly descended to her cabin.

The next day Lt. Cdr. Parker, RN, ADC to the Princess stepped from her cabin and said "Here is a history-making message." It read:

From Her Royal Highness Princess Elizabeth: His Majesty the King has been graciously pleased that I should signal his Royal Canadian Navy "SPLICE THE MAIN BRACE"

Which of course meant a double tot of rum for all on board. Nor surprisingly the ship's company gave the Royal couple three rousing cheers as they left the ship to return to the UK via the *Empress of Scotland*.



AIMERS' REMARKS EXTOL GOVERNOR GENERAL

There is so much to thank you for, Your Excellency. You have been a wonderful friend to the Crown and to the League - and we all think the world of you. You personally helped to bring about the issuance of The Queen Mother's 100th birthday stamp; the viceregal Lion is restored to its traditional strength, friendly and protective; you have been clear as to the dignity and efficacy of your role as The Queen's Representative following as you do 50 years of distinguished Canadian Governors General; and you have blazed fresh trails from re-energized State Visits, to journeys of compassion and concern such as you made to Labrador, to cross-country Levys - all making the Office of Governor General more visible, more potent, more inclusive, more dynamic.

One of the many reasons Canadians hold you and your Office in such renewed and deep esteem, Your Excellency, is your recalling to us, amidst discussion of so many continental influences of trade and common borders and common currency and common defence, those things that, surmounted by the Crown, identify and celebrate and distinguish our nationhood. And in no area has that been more evident than in your and His Excellency's sharing with us your passion for and knowledge of Canada as a Northern Land, and your concern for the First Nations with whom we share its space.

life had always been on sufferance, its pale slender shoots fighting a hard battle against the Elder Ice." And in "the great solitude," his survivor reflects, "I have made my peace with the North, faced up to it... and so won its blessing..."

I mentioned Your Excellencies' having blazed fresh trails for your Office. In the coming year, we are invited by you to physically walk with you through many parts of the land. You thus help us understand the land, make our peace with it, and never run away from its challenges be they steep peaks of aspiration, or currents of misunderstanding or rockstrewn valleys of dissension and intolerance.





PRINCE MICHAEL SPEAKS TO CANADIANS

Extracts from His Royal Highness' addresses across Canada

From Address to the Monarchist League of Canada Golden Jubilee Banquet, Toronto, March 15

Tennyson wrote of how in the path of duty lay the way to glory. Her Majesty has never sought any glory for herself: but in her unstinting round of duty and self-sacrifice she has achieved the love of her peoples and the respect of countless millions around the world. By her commitment to the Commonwealth, by her upholding of basic Christian values shared by humans of all backgrounds and religions, by her being herself in all seasons and circumstances, The Queen has become a part of our lives...

In a world often focused on self-indulgence, on "my" desires and "my" priorities and "my" agenda, The Queen's focus on the "we" and the "us" and on tolerance and getting along with each other, and on the needs and interests of others, has served as antidote, example and inspiration.

And that is why, ladies and gentlemen, from the uplands of Papua New Guinea to the jungles of Belize; from Stewart Island in New Zealand to the beaches of Jamaica; and most certainly from those living within the sound of Big Ben's chimes to the prairie farms, huts of the tundra and teeming cities of this Dominion; in countless tongues, from peoples of many different complexions and faiths and backgrounds; and from hearts full of respect and gratitude and deep affection, a common cry will echo and a common toast be raised in this year of Golden Jubilee: God Save The Queen!

From Address to the Essex & Kent Scottish Regiment, Windsor, March 16

The soldiers of this community fought with valour during World War II. A good number of those initial recruits saw service at Dieppe, and were numbered among the lost, captured, wounded or killed during that raid whose fearful cost nonetheless taught us valuable lessons about the conduct of future operations leading up to the Liberation of Europe. The memory of the brave who died at Dieppe is perpetuated at the Memorial not far distant from where we are today, where it was my privilege to lay a wreath earlier this afternoon.

Semper Paratus – always ready – is our Regimental motto. This is no idle boast. For today as in times past, the Regiment continues to exist within, and to support and reflect the nature of the communities of Southwestern Ontario. You who are its past and present serving members are very much aware of the heritage and sacrifices of those who have gone before, just as its citizen soldiers represent our communities with a pride that always stands ready to serve, one which characterizes our individual and collective responses to the new challenges that always lie ahead.

Some of the spirit of willingness to meet those challenges expresses itself in the geography of this rugged northern land of Canada; much is reflected in its military traditions of which I have been speaking; and of course that same good spirit resonates in its civilian population as the country celebrates its 135th anniversary of Confederation this July 1st. Both soldiers and civilians alike have been loyal to the Throne – for even before Confederation, Canada's history has been inextricably linked to the Crown, under which it has flourished. Thus I am especially happy to be traveling across the Dominion during the year of The Golden Jubilee of Her Majesty the Queen.

The Queen exemplifies service to others. My Regiment serves Queen and nation. And so it is that I look forward to being of service to you through my association with this distinguished Regiment and its extended Regimental Family for many, many years to come

From Speech to the Legislative Assembly of Alberta, Edmonton, March 18

The distinct evolution of the Canadian Crown points to the capacity of the constitutional monarchy to be a system of government that is infinitely adaptable. In this federal system, the Crown is actually an eleven-fold diadem, assuring the provinces that they are as fully sovereign in their areas of jurisdiction as is the national government in its own compass of responsibility.

The Golden Jubilee, then, is not only a time to pay tribute to The Queen to whom you and I are proud

to give our allegiance. It also offers an opportunity for everyone to learn more about the way nation and province are governed, and so to bolster patriotic sentiment with a grounded knowledge of the basis of Canadian parliamentary democracy, institutions and symbols.

With identity rooted in knowledge, and heartened by the beauty of mountains, prairies and lakes, "Fortis et liber" – strong and free, as the Alberta motto reads, will surely continue to be the proud and true boast of this energetic and loyal Province.

Writing on January 20th, 1842, while en route to Boston, Dickens slipped off his ship at Halifax, and by chance found himself at Province House, where a new Session of the Nova Scotia Legislature was opening. He described the scene thus:

"It happened to be the opening of the Legislative Council and General Assembly, at which ceremonial the forms observed on the commencement of a new Session of Parliament in England were so closely copied, and so gravely presented on a small scale, that it was like looking at Westminster through the wrong end of a telescope. The Governor, as her Majesty's representative, delivered what may be called the Speech from the Throne. He said what he had to say manfully and well. The military band outside the building struck up "God Save the Queen" with great vigour before his Excellency had quite finished; the people shouted; the in's rubbed their hands; the out's shook their heads; the Government party said there never was such a good speech; the opposition declared there never was such a bad one; the Speaker and members of the House of Assembly withdrew from the bar to say a great deal among themselves and do a little: and, in short, everything went on, and promised to go on, just as it does at home upon the like occasions."

Your Honour, may you always say what you have to say "manfully and well;" may the Government and Opposition ever freely debate; may the bands ever strike up the Royal Anthem – hopefully without interrupting you! and long may everything go on, and promise to go on, with the fierce pride and loyalty characteristic of this remarkable Province of Nova Scotia, to which I will most certainly "ever heave a sigh and a wish" to return.

Gold Badges – limited to 10 – are awarded for outstanding service at a Dominion level. These Badges are returned on the death of their holder and in time, presented to new deserving recipients, so forming a fellowship of continued dedication and loyalty down the years. Silver Badges mark outstanding service at a Branch level. Honorary Life Memberships may recognize public support for the Crown, or honour some particular service to the League's endeavours.

THE CANADIAN AND THE CROWN:

How John Buchan paved the way for Vincent Massey, the first non-British governor general.

Fifty years ago this month, Vincent Massey, the first Canadian-born gover-

nor general, moved into Rideau Hall. His appointment is generally considered to be the transition to Canadianizing the office of the governor general. It was, however, really only the achievement of a transition that seriously began 67 years ago, with the last governor general before the Second World War.

passionate Mr. Massey, as a well-about Canada known anglophile, was a compromise for those who doubted or mistrusted the Canadianization of this tradition-bound office. He also happened to be close to the Liberals and had been chairman of the Liberal party during the 1930s.

As governor general, Mr. Massey looked to one of his predecessors as a model, a man he had known since the 1920s. He wrote that he "greatly admired" Lord Tweedsmuir's work as governor general and "learnt much from it." Baron Tweedsmuir of Elsefield was John Buchan, member of the British Parliament, novelist, historian and publisher, when he was appointed governor general of Canada in March 1935.

The appointment of plain Mr. Buchan sparked a nation-wide debate about who should be governor general. Canadians were used to lords, if not members of the Royal Family itself. The break with tradition was a difficult one. Some said that if a commoner was to be governor, a Canadian could be just as good as any commoner from the "old country." It was ground prepared by the 1931 Statute of Westminster that gave the Dominions such as Canada equal status with Britain within the Empire, or Commonwealth, as it was also being called then.

On the day of the announcement, the Senate debated who should be filling the position of governor general itself. Seventy-year-old Raoul Dandurand, Liberal leader in the Senate, picked up the 1931 statute theme, pointing out that a Canadian being nominated as governor general would be in keeping with Canada's new status "of absolute equality." His colleague, Rodolphe Lemieux, remarked that the idea of having "a fullblooded Canadian as governor general" was one that had been in the public mind for some time already. They were expressing an opinion heard in French-Canada and by pacifists in the rest of the country that a Canadian-born governor would be less likely to involve Canada in a European conflict, which was becoming more and more a distinct possibility. The senators were quick to note, however, that these views in no way detracted from the qualities of the highly respected popular novelist himself.

Similar views were reflected in some Quebec newspapers and voiced by individuals from Ontario through the Prairies to British Columbia, as well as by chapters of a nationalist group called the Native Sons of Canada. Others were content to reflect on the significance of Mr. Buchan's appointment. The Globe in Toronto suggested: "Canadians will have reason to count themselves fortunate if the unadorned name of John Buchan is added to the list of Canadian governor general." "Fortunate" because he was a self-made man of many talents and accomplishments, not someone appointed simply because of a title. This was a view that Mackenzie King, then leader of the opposition and who knew Mr. Buchan, shared but did not voice at that time. He publicly noted only that he regarded the appointment "an excellent one."

But the unadorned name was not to remain so for long. Two months after the appointment, King George V granted Mr. Buchan a barony. This action assuaged somewhat the still very strong imperialist current in the Dominion. Many were now left disappointed, first that a peer had not been appointed, still

others that it was not plain John Buchan who would be governor general. His arrival in November 1935, shortly after Mackenzie King's Liberals were elected into power once again, provoked widespread debate. In the end, however, the vast majority welcomed this unique governor general.

Tweedsmuir brought less formality to Rideau Hall. His approach to the job was to see as much of Canada as possible, drawing Canadians' attention to other parts of their country and, in particular, the North, all with a view to minimizing the regionalism he witnessed. His speeches, written himself and generally delivered without notes, inspired his many and varied audiences. He promoted a strong sovereign Canada because he believed the Commonwealth could not be strong if its component parts were not. This was also a strategic question, as war clouds gathered over Europe.

John Buchan's appointment, then his work as governor general Lord Tweedsmuir, acted as catalysts to Canadianizing the Crown. Vincent Massey carried on that work. But contrary to many contemporary Canadianizers, the Crown was central to both Lord Tweedsmuir's and Mr. Massey's vision for Canada.

If Mr. Massey was the most British of our Canadian governors general, Lord Tweedsmuir was the most Canadian of our British governors. These two individuals constitute the transition to the Canadianization of the post; albeit a transition interrupted by the war, during which ties to Britain and the Empire were practically and emotionally strengthened. The transition was completed in a wonderfully symbolic way, with Mr. Massey using Lord Tweedsmuir's Windsor uniform that had been sent over by Lady Tweedsmuir. Mr. Massey was very similar in stature to Lady Tweedsmuir's late husband, who had died while still in office, in February 1940, after a fall in which he struck his head.

As we reflect on 50 years of Canadian governors general, we should focus on the Tweedsmuir-Massey transition and on their approach and vision for inspiration to strengthen our distinctiveness, while still knowing properly where in the world we belong.

Alexandra: A Life of the Last Tsarina by Carolly Erickson Constable, £14.99

Plotted against by her Mother-in-Law, condemned as a German hausfrau by Court and public, and tormented by migraines and other

psychosomatic illnesses, Alexandra's deep unhappiness led to her taking up Rasputin, with the consequences for the dynasty that followed. Based on secondary sources, reviewers felt the book too narrowly focused on this "not very appealing victim of history, and of bad luck."

Diana: A Cultural History by Jude Davies Palgrave, £45.00

Psycho-babble leaves the Diana story and the reason for her popularity as elu-

Diana: Story of a Princess by Tim Clayton and Phil Craig Hodder & Stoughton, £18.99

A portrait of the troubled Princess based on the ITV series - called "convincing and moving."

The Duchess of Kent by Mary Ruddekk, Pan £7.99

Life has had its ups and downs for this most prominent member of the Royal Family to convert to Rome: marriage, her popularity from public duties and her nervous breakdown are all chronicled with what one reviewer called "a finely judged sympathy."

Elizabeth: the Woman and the Queen by Graham Turner MacMillan, £18.99

An impeccably sourced book, expanded from a series of incisive articles Turner wrote for The Daily Telegraph. Critics suggest this is the work which most accurately profiles The Queen as she is today, and the influences which make her at once so intriguing and elusive.



God Save The Queen: The Spiritual Dimension of Monarchy by Ian Bradley Darton, Longman & Todd, £14.95

In a recent opinion piece, the author states his conviction that "The Queen is a considerably more devout and faithful Christian than the vast majority of her subjects." Reviewers enjoyed this book's "illuminating dissection" of the Coronation service, which the author doubts will ever be seen again in its 1953 form. He traces minutely the relationship between church and state since the time of Henry VIII, and gives a general appraisal of the current Royal Family's churchmanship. Some critics have assailed the work as "reactionary."

The Monarchy: An Oral Biography of Elizabeth II by Deborah & Gerald Strober Hutchinson, £20.00

Illuminating portrait of The Queen by those who have come into direct contact with her over the years.

A Peerage for Trade: A History of the Royal Warrant by Tim Heald

Sinclair-Stevenson, £26.00

The record of suppliers to the Royal Household stretches back to 1300, and numbers one William Caxton in the 15th century, Henry VIII's "laundresse" and the Pork-in-Ordinary (otherwise known as a sausage maker) to Victoria, not to mention, until recently, the odious El-Fayed of Harrods fame. A "jolly good

Henry & Mary Ponsonby: Life at the Court of Queen Victoria by William Kuhn Duckworth, £20.00

A tie-in with the much-praised series and very positively-oriented BBC Jubilee series on The Queen, to be aired July 2-3 by CBC, Shawcross' richly-illustrated book is judged "stylish and intelligent" by British critics.

The Queen: Elizabeth II and the Monarchy by Ben Pimlott Harper Collins, £24.00

Pimlott, a prominent British socialist, has augmented his generally sympathetic 1996 biography with over 200 new pages of material, including a gripping account of how The Queen's Private Secretary, Sir Robert (now Lord) Fellowes, Diana's brother-in-law, played a key and hitherto-unsung role in holding together the Monarchy in its moment of maximum peril during the week after her death.

Royal: Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II by Robert Lacey

The well-known biographer has updated his Silver Jubilee appraisal of The Queen, Majesty. But some British reviewers found the additional material - for which he interviewed 129 sources - as "hefty but insubstantial," arguing that Graham Turner's profile of The Queen in The Daily Telegraph was much more illuminating.

LEAGUE E-MEMBERS EFFECTIVE: WEB SITE HITS SOAR

If readers spend any time at all on the Web these days, they are familiar the proliferation of instant on-line polls conducted by many news outlets from The Globe and Mail to local radio stations. These soundings do not pretend to be "scientific," but their results are reported, and can be trumpeted by the republican opposition if they go in their favour. The power of the League's "e-team" was demonstrated in February when CTV mounted such a poll about whether participants support the Monarchy. Initial results were running 53-47% against; then the Dominion Chairman had his attention drawn to the survey, and asked members to register their opinions, so the outcome turned around to a 63-37%

A sign of the huge interest in the Monarchy during Jubilee Year, sadly bolstered by the extensive coverage of the deaths of The Queen Mother and Princess Margaret, has been reflected in a surge in the number of unduplicated "hits" on the League's two web sites (as well as a mutlifold increase in recruitment through its trial member offer). As of mid-June, the volume on the main League site www.monarchist.ca was running 47,000 annually, with the new Jubilee site www.goldenjubilee.ca running at 16,500 per annum and surging.

BULLETIN BOARD

The League's Bulletin Board, developed in the Summer of 2001 by Toronto students Alan Palmer and Ben Sheridan, has now been functioning for over half a year. Designed for members and friends of the League, the site has attracted several thousand postings (automatically

deleted at 600), in a variety of quality, ranging from the informational to the arcane; but certainly debates on a great many items of monarchical interest consume chief attention - these include whether Canada should have its own Crown Jewels, the design of the Royal Arms of Canada, exactly what is a "default monarchist," and the teaching of Canadian History. Sadly, some republican trouble-makers bent on conducting personal "flame wars" along with anonymous posters peddling pornography and other - idiosyncratic - posts make the Moderator's job sometimes a difficult one. However, as in all developing forums, a modus vivendi for civil discourse is developing, which, it is hoped, will obviate the need for a pre-approved membership-type board. EXTRACT FROM HER HONOUR'S REMARKS



JACQUELINE BARLOW, RIP

With the death of Jacqueline Barlow on Good Friday 2002 in St John's, one of the most colourful figures of the first decade of The Monarchist League of Canada vanished from the scene. It was her marriage in 1952 to Sir Christopher Barlow, 7th Bart, however, that took her to Newfoundland where she was to spend most of her life. Going from Eton to study architecture at McGill University in Montreal, Sir Christopher subsequently set up in practice at St John's. The Barlows were an old family which had been honoured with a baronetcy from King George III for services to the Crown in India.

Lady Barlow's sixteen years as Newfoundland Chairman of the League were characterized by a formidable, compelling style. It was not in character for her to toil at creating a viable branch by building a strong membership and establishing effective institutional structures. Quite the contrary. Jacqueline Barlow had a very different idea of what the League should do to make the public aware that a solid core of the Canadian population loved and supported its Queen. It was the bold, headline-catching public relations stroke she felt would best accomplish this. Two years after becoming Chairman she found and realized just such an opportunity.

It was 1977, the year of the Queen's Silver Jubilee. Lady Barlow decided to get up a Declaration of Loyalty for her fellow Newfoundlanders to sign to express their fidelity to the Sovereign for the occasion. The title Declaration of Loyalty was an intentional allusion to the Canadian alternative to that other famous Declaration, the Declaration of Independence. Her project developed slowly at first. Then she hit on the brilliant idea of enlisting the help of the post mistresses of the province. In Newfoundland and Labrador post offices are a major channel of government communication with the

people. So when Newfoundlanders visited the post office to collect a cheque or buy a money order they found the Declaration of Loyalty awaiting them and signed it in droves. By the time it was finalised, over 300,000 signatures were affixed to its pages, signatures comprising four fifths of the population of the province. Tied up in red, white and blue ribbons, the Declaration of Loyalty was presented to Her Majesty at Balmoral Castle in September 1977, having been taken to the United Kingdom by Newfoundland war veterans.

Next year when the Queen was in the province, Her Majesty said in her televised speech at the provincial dinner in St John's: "I was deeply moved by the Declaration of Loyalty signed by three hundred thousand Newfoundlanders in my Silver Jubilee Year". Lady Barlow of course was presented to Her Majesty. The Queen asked if there was anything she could do to show her gratitude. Jacqueline, never slow to seize an opportunity, promptly asked her for a golden labrador puppy from the Sandringham estate. The Queen agreed. Labradors were another of Lady Barlow's major

All this activity provided a much needed public and positive face for the Monarchist League in Newfoundland. Lady Barlow's efforts in other areas of her Branch were less successful. Her unilateral institution of dollar memberships for the League in Newfoundland - she maintained ordinary people there could not afford its regular membership - endangered the organization's need to have a standard national fee and caused friction with the Dominion office and other branches. More important, it failed to produce many new members. Such considerations however were of secondary importance to Lady Barlow's vision of what the League should be in her province.

She continued to seek new PR opportunities. Though never again hitting on anything as sensational as the Declaration of Loyalty, she chalked up other successes. In 1979 she helped secure the approval of the Cabinet in Ottawa for the designation 'Royal' bestowed on the Newfoundland Constabulary, one of the oldest police forces in North America, by Her Majesty The Queen on 7 June that year. Four years later Lady Barlow raised \$1,300 to pay for the Colour for the force. The Colour was dedicated in a PHOTO CREDITS: Rideau Hall & Michael Hudson

widely publicized ecumenical service and presented by Jacqueline herself in great style. In 1986 she organized celebrations to mark the 200th anniversary of the arrival of Prince William, later King William IV, in Newfoundland in 1786. Prince William, third son of King George III, was the first member of the Royal Family to come to Canada, so the Prince William Bicentenary also had a national dimension. For the celebration, the Newfoundland Branch commissioned New York artist Louise Topping to paint a portrait of Prince William for St Luke's Church in Placentia, the historic town on the island's south coast where the Prince spent the summer of 1786 and later paid for the erection of a church, endowing it with silver Communion Plate. (The painting and plate are now in the Parks Canada museum on Castle Hill, Placentia.) Though the exact day of Prince William's arrival in June 1786 is not known, Lady Barlow also made an attempt to have June 19, the most likely date, popularly recognized as "Prince William Day".

As Branch Chairman she was indefatigable, visiting junior high schools to talk about the Monarchy, promoting essay contests, writing letters and lobbying officials. She also visited other Branches and made lasting friendships with League members in different parts of the country. At times her strong personality prevented her from realizing the full possibility of official and social relations with Government House in St John's, though she enlisted the support of various former viceregal representatives for her many projects. Her attitude towards her adopted province was that of a loving critic. Some Toronto League members, after being treated to a diatribe by her against the iniquities of the "Newfie joke", were amazed when she suddenly broken off to say "But, have you heard this one?" and launched into a classic example of what she had just been inveighing against. In other ways she reflected local provincialism which often fitted her own conservative outlook on life.

A turning point in her years as League Branch Chairman was the arrival of the promised labrador retriever bred at the royal kennels and named appropriately Sandringham Chive. Lady Barlow doted on him. Everyone – the Queen in particular - was kept informed of the dog's growth and development. His portrait was painted and presented to the Sovereign and he was brought out on royal occasions such as the visits of the Prince of Wales, Princess Royal and Earl of Wessex (then Prince Edward). Sandringham's death in September 1993 at 14 was a great sadness for Jacqueline. By then she had retired as Branch Chairman. At the Queen's Ruby Jubilee Banquet in Toronto in 1992, she was awarded a Silver Badge of Service for her League work. She received it from the hands of the guest of honour, His Majesty King Michael I of Romania. The citation read aloud at the presentation noted that Ladv Barlow had "raised the Monarchy's profile in Newfoundland and Labrador by her unstinting efforts at promoting the League's causes in diverse ways" and praised her "fierce loyalty and unmistakable personal style". Poor health in the years that followed severely reduced her involvement in League work but nothing could diminish her loyalty to her Queen.

Tall and distinguished in appearance,

Lady Barlow had a hearty, jolly manner, and was a rapid, enthusiastic talker who could also listen. She was good fun, as ready to contribute a bottle of champagne to a restaurant party as to enliven the group with her own mirth and vivacity. The gifts of imagination and versatility that made her an effective exponent of the Monarchy of course made her at times a difficult colleague too. She leaves to mourn her loss her husband of fifty years, a son, two daughters and several grandchildren. Those in the League who knew her will remember her with gratitude and affection. - GAHB On behalf of all League members, the Dominion Chairman arranged to have flowers placed on the High Altar of the Cathedral at Saint John's in Jac's memory.

Sean McCarron's rebuttal (and rebuke) to Simpson

In your article... the monarchists of Canada have been painted with an arche-

typical brush often used to describe the monarchy itself – that we are aging armchair philosophists. Those who talk a lot but are slow to act.

As much as I enjoy expe-

riencing other people's points of view and wholeheartedly support free-thought - I must disagree with you, and I'll try to explain where I'm coming from in a thoughtful and kind manner. I'm 15 years old, of Irish descent, I'm considered a "punk rocker", and I'm also a monarchist. Not cut from traditional wheat, I assure you.

In your article I was rather disappointed to find that in your attempts to put the spotlight on the monarchy's archaic uselessness, you made a personal attack on Princess Margaret. Seemingly borne from bitter randomness, you referred to her life as "aimless". In my opinion, this is besides the point of your article and unfortunate to read. I certainly wouldn't enjoy reading "Lead an aimless life" on MY tombstone just because I didn't necessarily live up to the standards and highlives of those around me.

Also in your article, you express concerns that no Canadian "with a sense of Canada" has ever seen him or herself in the British. This is indeed a rather confusing and ambiguous statement, as why would a Canadian not be able to see him or herself in another nationality? Truly, if we are such a "multicultural" society, as we so often tout, then why are we so bent on needless ethnic division? Even if the Crown was indeed only a British possession, it would not be a fellow Canadian's place to tell anyone else where they can find their sense of nationality in a multicultural 'utopia' as it were. After all, shouldn't we be embracing all cultures, traditional and non-traditional? Let's put

aside what ethnicity the Queen Mum (a phrase coined by a Canadian journalist, I believe) was of, and look at her for who she was. She was a kind old woman that anyone who met her viewed her as just another human being – a down-to-earth grandmother with realistic thoughts and ideas. Only then can we be free from bias.

In this article also you seem to attack the media coverage of the Royal Tour of 1939 - forgive me if I'm mistaken, but you seem to be missing the historical significance of this visit. After the Statute of Westminster (1931 I believe), we were our own self-governing Dominion, free to make our own foreign policies and choices regarding wars, etc. You say the tour "was by no means the most important event of that terrible, fateful year in which the Second World War began". Keep in mind that this Royal Tour of 1939 enshrined the love of the monarchy upon the Canadian people of the time. When the British and French went to arms against Hitler on 3 September 1939, we were not automatically at war as was the case in 1914 for WWI. We had a week to stew over our decision, and in the end, on 10 September 1939, we independently declared war. The Canadian military of that time was to become truly a force to be reckoned with, and a very crucial aide in the war. The point is that our love for the monarchy and for humanitarian rights was what propelled us into Second World War – not British pressures. This Royal Tour of 1939 was in many ways the enforcer of this Canadian love of our shared monarchy – and where would the Allies have been without us?

You also seem upset that she is referred to as "One of the most amazing queens since Cleopatra". You point out that she had no real political power - an argument I always find interesting because anti-monarchists would be upset by a monarch's power or lack of power, whatever the case may be. I'm sure if she had vast power in her time then republicans such as yourself wouldn't have been terribly pleased that we allowed ourselves to be "manipulated" by a "foreign figurehead". You also seem to be forgetting how steely she was during the days of her highest fame - particularly the days of the Blitzkrieg or Lightning War on Britain by the Germans. Queen or no Queen, she willingly stepped right out into the rubble and placed herself on the same level as her self-designated "subjects", displaying that she too was human and would stand with them to the end. This boost of morale, some veterans still claim, was what helped Britons jump back into the fight and overcome German opposition, forcing the bombings to stop. The Queen Mum put herself on the line for the sake of her subjects who were more than willing to return the favour. And, with regards to history, I think thankfully so. "Never was so much owed by so many to so few."

You point out here that there has not been a tremendous showing at Parliament Hill or the Oueen Mother's residence. What's important to realize is that the monarchy's influence and span is not limited to one centralized region – it is truly widespread and people from all different types embrace it. Not all of them have the ability to show up at Her Majesty's front door to lay flowers, but we can all remember her, put our flags at half-mast, and hopefully even perform acts of kindness in her remembrance. I'm

sure republicans would groan at the "waste of time and money" if a sea of people were to travel, showing up in remembrance.

You also claim that the institution of monarchy is a British one that we lean on, and not a Canadian one, at the end. It is important to keep in mind that Queen Elizabeth II was crowned Queen of Canada on the same day she was crowned as Queen of England and Australia and what-have-you. Although the royal family themselves have permanent residence in England, the system of government which they are symbolic of is active and relevant in all regions within the Realm. The system of constitutional monarchy truly is democratic representation of all people as the monarch soars above and beyond politics. The Queen's duty as Head of State is to represent her subjects, while not belonging to any particular political leaning. In this, unlike a President (for lack of a better comparison), all of her decisions would be made entirely based on what is best for her people - and not what is best for the political party she's affixed to. This is important to me as a citizen because knowing that we have that security in place is a comfortable feeling to me. To know that when it comes right down to it, the people truly are in charge of the government, not the government in charge of the people. Keep in mind that within a constitutional monarchy, all of Her Majesty's decisions must be made within the legal confinements of the nation she governs. Further, if ever her power were to be abused (a highly unlikely situation), it would be within the subject's capabilities to throw her out and disregard her decisions, should worse come to worse. Ultimately, it is entirely within Canadians' power to feel secure and safe within our government.

The monarchy is relevent and important to me. That is all. A very gracious thank-you for all of your time. I understand you must be very busy but I wanted to at least tell you where this 15 yearold stands.



Jubilé d'Or de Sa Majesté Élisabeth II, Reine du Canada -Célébration à Montréal

Le mercredi 6 février 2002, à 17 h 45, en l'église Saint-Jean-l'Évangéliste de l'avenue Président-Kennedy, à Montréal, «La petite église au toit rouge», une messe eucharistique solennelle a été célébrée en l'honneur de Sa Majesté Élisabeth II, Reine du Canada, à l'occasion de son cinquantième anniversaire d'accession au trône.

Construite entre 1877 et 1878, la charmante église restée fidèle à la tradition catholique au sein de l'Église anglicane, a été le siège d'une émouvante cérémonie religieuse d'une heure et demie. Cette cérémonie rassembla des centaines de paroissiens et de monarchistes qui avaient répondu à l'appel de la Ligue monarchique du Canada et du révérend K.A. Schmidt, recteur de l'église, qui concélébra en compagnie d'une dizaine de confrères, dont le vénérable Peter Hannen, archidoyen de Montréal; le révérend Éric E. Dyck, pasteur de l'Église luthérienne St. John; et le révérend Marc-Philippe Vincent qui chanta l'évangile en français.

L'honorable Lise Thibault, lieutenantgouverneur du Québec, fit son entrée précédée de son aide de camp aux accords du God Save the Queen interprété aux grandes orgues par le titulaire K.M. Komisaruk, directeur de la musique, qui dirigea aussi durant toute la cérémonie une chorale d'une douzaine de chanteurs en aubes blanches.

Du haut de la chaire, le révérend Arlen Bonnar, ministre de l'Église unie St. James, fit une homélie fort bien sentie au sujet de Sa Majesté Élisabeth II, Reine du Canada, et de la monarchie.

L'office religieux se prolongea par une rencontre amicale au Centre communautaire, avec la présence du lieutenantgouverneur qui prononça une allocution et qui reçut avec beaucoup de chaleur et de simplicité les hommages émus de chacune des personnes présentes. 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

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
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
